PASTOR'S PAGE

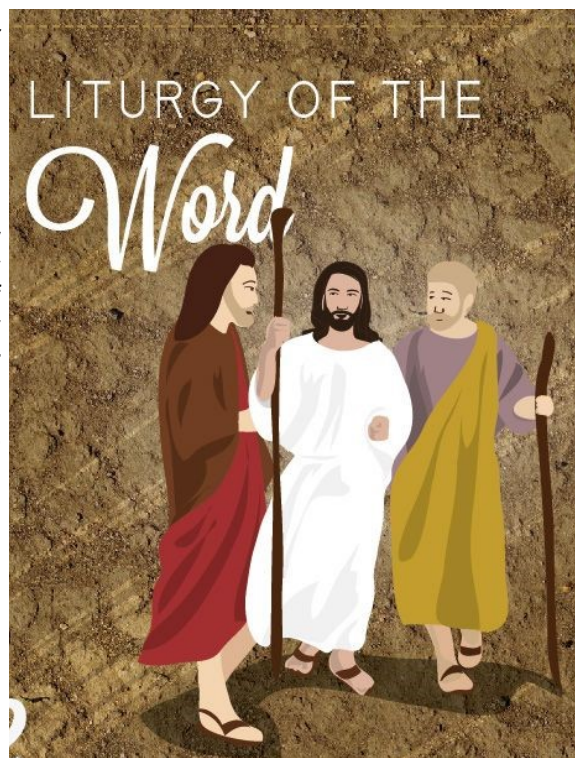
As we continue to walk-through the parts of the Mass, this weekend we are hearing about the Liturgy of the Word. The Liturgy of the Word on Sundays begins with an Old Testament reading (though during Easter the first reading is taken from the New Testament), a psalm, a New Testament reading, and a Gospel reading. Each reading is very important. Although there is sometimes a heretical misconception that the God of the Old Testament is, or at least acts differently than, the God of the New Testament, when we hear the Old and New Testaments proclaimed right after each other, we realize just how false that idea is. In fact, the way the current lectionary (the book that we get our readings from) is laid out, the Old Testament reading is typically lined up with the Gospel reading, so we can see how Jesus fulfills the Old Testament rather than abolishes it. The readings also usually have a unifying theme, or at least, most of them do (the second reading, taken from the New Testament, is often the proverbial odd man out). Sometimes it is hard to figure out what the unifying theme or motif tying the readings together is, so when that is the case, I recommend looking at the psalm. Frequently the psalm, which we sing together in response, can be an effective hermeneutical key for the readings (hermeneutics refers to the methods we use to interpret Scripture). Hopefully we are able to see through all of the readings the bright continuity of God's eternal plan to save us as it plays out in the Scriptures, and especially through the words and actions of Jesus Christ in the Gospel.

All of which just goes to show that special attention can and must be given to the Gospel. In the Gospel, we hear the words that Jesus actually spoke during his life and ministry repeated to us. We hear how Jesus fulfills every promise that God made to his people in the Old Testament. And we see how Jesus establishes His Church, using ordinary, broken human beings like you and me, so that there would be a place for us in His Kingdom too. The Gospel, which comes from an ancient word which means "good news," is just that: the good news that Jesus has saved us, is saving us, and will save us. There is a timelessness and a beauty in the words of Christ which, if we have ears to hear, we can receive, just like his first disciples.

The final two parts of the Liturgy of the Word are the Creed (which takes place after what is hopefully a good, or failing that, at least a short homily from the priest or deacon) and the Prayers of the Faithful. Both deserve mentioning. What we call the Nicene Creed is actually the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed, written and codified at the Council of Constantinople in AD 381. If you think that was a long time ago, consider that the original Nicene Creed, which was the template for the Creed we still use today and which shares many of the same words, was written in AD 325 at the Council of Nicaea. The Creed is, simply, our statement of faith. There is nothing contained in it which is not a necessary part of the Christian faith. That is not to say that it contains every necessary thing in the deposit of the faith, but everything there is necessary if you want to claim the name "Christian." Even the word catholic towards the end is necessary (catholic, means "universal," so with the lower case c, this is essentially stating that the Church is for everyone). When the Incarnation of Jesus is mentioned – "by the power of the Holy Spirit, he was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man" – we perform what liturgically is called a "profound bow," that is, a bow at the waist, before resuming our previous standing posture. We do this out of reverence for the mystery of the Incarnation, which is the means by which Jesus entered the world to save us from our sins. We close the Liturgy of the Word by offering up our prayers and petitions to the Heavenly Father. Here we are united, not only with each other, but also with all of the angels and saints in heaven who are praying with us, as we beg for God's mercy, love, and blessing upon us, our families, our communities, and ultimately the world. It is also the perfect bridge to what we will talk about next week, the Liturgy of the Eucharist, because it is precisely these requests, along with our paltry gifts, that we will offer on the altar of God as the Sacrifice of the Mass continues.
