### <u>"I Am Not Afraid — I Was Born to Do This."</u>

Have you ever felt like you weren't doing the work you should be doing?

We have all had jobs that leave us feeling unfulfilled. Bored. Dreading the next day. We may even experience a sensation of unfamiliarity, of being unable to recognize ourselves.

Most of us have also been lucky enough to have a job that we love — a vocation, a calling that makes us look in the mirror and think, This. This is who I'm supposed to be. I recognize this person.

For me, that work is the work of marriage and motherhood. The hours are terrible, the pay is even worse, and my coworkers are frequently disappointed in me — but it doesn't matter. When I look in the mirror every morning and see my tired, wrinkled face gazing back, choruses of "I said I don't want the BLUE SHIRT, MOMMY, ugh!" and "Honey, I've got an early meeting, I'm so sorry but I have to run," ringing in the background, I think to myself: I recognize this girl. She was born to do this.

Christ's own disciples did not recognize him on the road to Emmaus. It wasn't until he took the bread and broke it that their eyes were opened, and they realized they had known it all along — "Were not our hearts burning within us?"

In that moment, Christ was doing the very work he was born to do, making the sacrifice.

I don't know what kind of vocation you are called to. I don't know what kind of work reveals your true self. But I hope that whatever work you are doing, you can look in the mirror and feel your heart burning within you.

"He was made known to them in the breaking of bread." — Luke 24:35



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The road to Emmaus is one of my favorite Gospel stories because it shows a Jesus that is masterful at reaching people. First, when he comes upon those walking on the road, he asks them what they are talking about and then asks them to explain. How often are we too eager to just start talking at people when we feel they need to hear what we have to say? Jesus offers an invitation for them to share first. Allowing them to share first opens them up for what Jesus will do next.

Second, Jesus takes time to interpret for them the words of the prophets. He gave them their turn and now it is his. Not only wise, but a movement of respect. After a long walk, they invite Jesus stay with them and dine. Third and finally, Jesus breaks bread with them and they are able to see that he is no ordinary traveler. He is the risen One. He could have just told them who he was, but allowing them by their experience to uncover who he was had the greater impact.

Jesus demonstrated to us in these actions how to be gracious and impactful when sharing the good news. If we are to be good stewards and fruitful disciples then we must imitate him in this regard. This Easter season let us practice the following: 1) Allow others first to share what they have to say. 2) Then be willing to take the time to explain fully or to the best of our ability our faith. And 3) help others find a way to experience firsthand the message you have shared. No one can understand love without witnessing love. In this way, your words and deeds will become a pathway to Jesus for others.

#### Who knew you could receive First Holy Communion early?!

Growing up, my family attended St. Joseph's Parish in Golden, Colorado, and the pastor, Monsignor Berry, was close with my parents. I remember him being around my family as a kid, and I always admired his joy.

To this day, he remains a great influence on my life. (I had the opportunity to preach at his funeral Mass, and he gifted me with his chalice after my priestly ordination!)

But let's start at the beginning . . .

One day, Monsignor came into my first grade classroom unexpectedly and called me out into the hallway. (Honestly, I thought I was in trouble!)

"Do you know your Act of Contrition?" he asked me.

"Yes, Monsignor!" I responded.

"Well, that's good! . . . because you are going to make your first confession right now!"

So, right there in the hallway of the school, I had the gift of receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time.

I remember Monsignor looking at me after confession. ("Jesus, looking at him, loved him." –Mark 10:21)

And then he said, "Tell your parents you can receive your first Holy Communion this Sunday."

Monsignor was retiring, and he wanted me to be an altar server for him during his last six months at the parish. As I began serving in the first grade, I felt very special. Monsignor had chosen me; and because of this special, preferential love, I came to know that God, too, had chosen me. It wasn't long after that that I knew I wanted to become a priest like Monsignor.

Jesus Christ is "the one whom the Father has consecrated and sent into the world" (John 10:36). He is the anointed one, the chosen one, the "beloved son," as the Father said at his baptism.

But this anointing, this being chosen, is true of each of us. This is what it means to be baptized: we are anointed with sacred Chrism at our baptism, and the Father looks at you and says, "this is my beloved daughter" or "this is my beloved son." "You are the one whom I have anointed and sent into the world." He has anointed you just as he anointed his Beloved Son with the power of his Holy Spirit. He has consecrated you and set you apart for himself, and he has given you a special mission in his Kingdom.

This means that you are special to him. And until you feel like you are the most loved person in the world, you have not understood his love. He would have died and rose from the dead only for you, so special you are to him. He comes particularly to you in every Holy Communion because you are his beloved, and he wants to be one with you.

Until we receive this truth—this incredible, life-saving truth—we cannot receive all that he wants to give us. Not only are we missing out on the joy and peace he offers us, but you and I cannot receive the very particular mission he has for us.

Yes, God has a particular mission for you. A mission that only you can fulfill. A mission that you, quite honestly, were made for. Not because God needs you, but because he wants to fulfill you.

This Easter Day, as we celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord, I invite you to ponder the profound mystery of God's overwhelming love. Imagine the Risen Jesus who comes to you in Holy Communion looking at you saying: "You are mine. You are anointed. You are chosen. You are loved." Ponder it. Over and over again in these Octave days. Ask for the grace to receive and know this truth in a lasting way. He wants you to know that he chose you out of all the others in first grade, that you are special to him.

If you receive this truth, it will set your heart on fire, and you won't be able to stop yourself from sharing it.

Andrew Tompkins Memorial College Scholarship Award



Andrew Joseph Tompkins was born to Diana and Paul Tompkins on Easter Sunday, April 12, 1998. He is survived by two sisters, Marion and Julia. He received the sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Communion, and Confirmation at our family parish, Queen of Angels Church in Alpine, California. He was very active in our parish as a member of the children's choir, a long-time altar server, a member of the 412 Church Youth Ministry Group, and he attended the Steubenville Youth Conferences throughout his high school years.

Andrew graduated from Granite Hills High School in 2016 and attended the University of La Verne (ULV) on an academic scholarship to study business marketing. He received the Knights of Columbus scholarship award for the two years he attended ULV and was grateful to the Knights Council for the financial support. Andrew had a passion for learning. He was an Honor Student and an accomplished swimmer and diver in high school and college.

Unfortunately, Andrew was diagnosed with cancer in his second year of college and was forced to suspend his studies while he had surgery and went through chemotherapy for several months. After a very tough battle, the Lord called him home on September 22, 2019 at the age of 21. While Andrew's time at ULV was short, he completed enough units to receive his Associate of Arts degree (posthumous). He was a natural born student and loved school and university life. He would be honored to know that this scholarship fund is now named after him. Indeed, his family is honored that Andrew's memory will live on through all students who go off to college with big hopes and dreams and remain strong in the Catholic faith.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

April 23, 2023/3rd Sunday of Easter

I always feel a little sad when someone begins to speak to me with the words, "Father, I know you're so busy, but ..." It happens a lot. And I get it. He or she is trying to be respectful of my time. But it saddens me because a priest makes Jesus present to people in a special way, and Jesus always has time for us. Don't we all feel at times that God just doesn't have time for us?

Nonsense. Just look at the stunning "Road to Emmaus" story we hear this week. It's the day Jesus rose from the dead. And the Risen One appears in disguise to two disciples. He walks with them, chats with them, and eventually eats with them. It could have been hours he spends with them — two unnamed persons — in the middle of nowhere. On the day he rose from the dead!

My friends, please take this to heart: The Risen Jesus is not too busy to spend time with you! He doesn't have "better things to do." You and I are members of this crucified and risen Body. He therefore has all the time in the world to be with us. So, I challenge you this week to approach him confidently in prayer and conversation. After all, being with you and me is the reason he rose from the dead.
