# **PASTOR'S PAGE**

Friends,

Earlier this past week we celebrated the feast day of St. Mark the Evangelist, who wrote what is, in our Bibles at least, the second gospel, but what many scholars believe may have actually been the first gospel chronologically. But the story of St. Mark is far more than just the story of an author. In fact, the story of his life and his faith journey can serve as a beautiful reminder to us of God's faithfulness.

When we first encounter Mark in the Book of Acts, he is a young man – perhaps even a teenager – who is on fire for the Lord and is eager to serve him, so he joins Paul and Barnabas on their first missionary journey. Unfortunately for Mark, and much to the chagrin of Paul, he ended up leaving the group at Perga. Whether he did so out of fear, because he felt overwhelmed, or because he simply wasn't ready, we don't know. But he left, and it ended up being something that bothered Paul so much that he would struggle to forgive the young man for it.

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Some time later, when Paul and Barnabas were preparing to set out on their second missionary journey, Barnabas wanted to give Mark a second chance and bring him along again, but Paul was adamant that he not come. I can easily imagine Barnabas – who was the first Christian to welcome Paul after his baptism – reminding Paul of how the community of believers had given him another chance despite how he had persecuted them; and I can easily imagine Paul, who was not famous for pulling punches, responding strongly. It's probably for the best, but we don't know exactly what was said, only that it was a very contentious dispute that ended up with Paul and Barnabas parting ways. Paul took Silas and Luke on his subsequent journeys, while Barnabas took Mark under his wing. At some point, Mark also teamed up with Simon Peter, who himself knew something about second chances. And that's where his story really starts to get interesting.

While he was not ready the first time he headed out on mission with Paul and Barnabas, at some point while he was with Simon Peter, the switch flipped. He became a faithful companion to Peter, to the point that Peter in his first epistle refers to Mark as "my son." The young man who was too afraid when he started out found his courage in Christ and was a trusted confidant and co-worker of one of Jesus' closest friends. Mark followed Peter to Rome before eventually founding the Church in Alexandria (which would become a hub of theology whose leaders staunchly defended the faith against the heresies that threatened the early Church), but as we mentioned at the beginning, he is most famous for his gospel. And while a full discussion of Mark's gospel would take far more space than this bulletin has, here's two of the more amazing things about it in my opinion... You see, the Gospel of Mark is written from the perspective of Peter, who would have related all of those stories to him. This tells us a lot about the humility and growth St. Peter, who I can picture insisting to St. Mark the importance of including the more embarrassing stories about him that we find throughout the gospel. Anytime we run across a story about Simon Peter in any of the first three gospels (Matthew and Luke have large portions of their gospel that are pulled directly from Mark), we are hearing it as he told it to his friend Mark.

But the second amazing thing we can learn about Mark from his gospel has less to do with the gospel itself and more to do with how it is depicted in Scripture and in religious art. In the book of Revelation, St. John sees four living creatures in heaven, and those are held to be symbolic of the four written gospels, with each creature corresponding to a different gospel. Matthew's gospel is depicted as the man (or angel, depending on your translation), Luke as the ox, John as the eagle, and Mark... fearful Mark who left Paul and Barnabas... is depicted as the lion. The scared, insecure teenager who was in over his head went on to write the gospel that is symbolized by the lion, perhaps the bravest and noblest of all the wild beasts. Because of course he did. What is so amazing about this is that God saw something in Mark that no one else saw, not even Barnabas, something that God knew was there because he put it there when he created him. God was patient with Mark, and put people in his path to help him find his way – Simon Peter and Barnabas, certainly, but even Paul in his own way helped form Mark into St. Mark. And this – for me at least – is an even greater reminder of God's faithfulness to us than if Mark had gotten it right the first time. Because when I remember St. Mark, I'm reminded that God is never finished with us.

## **Cut to the Heart**

Everyone who has been married knows this feeling: you're in the midst of a disagreement with your spouse. You've really dug in your heels. You're ready to die on this hill. And you have the awful, heartbreaking realization that you are wrong. Whatever it is you're arguing about, you're wrong. You.

So where do you go from here? The only way forward is to own it. Fess up. Grab a fork and dig into that humble pie. It makes me cringe just to write about it, because it's the worst feeling.

I use the example of marriage because it's the one I'm most familiar with — my closest relationship, the one that teaches me the most about who I am and who God asks me to be. But this is a universal experience, and everyone — single or married, child or adult, lay or ordained — knows how badly it feels to realize that you're wrong. You're human. You messed up.

It is hard to recognize that the Christian life is one of ongoing repentance. It is painful to acknowledge the ways in which we are falling short, even as we strive to follow in Christ's example.

It can, in the words of today's reading, "cut to the heart."

But that feeling of despair is what propels forward motion. We have to allow ourselves to feel bad, that's the fertile ground of penitence. We are meant to have not just life, but life "more abundantly." Stasis isn't the goal. Baptism isn't the finish line.

Examining our conscience is hard. It cuts to the heart. It cuts to the truth.


