

GOSPEL MEDITATION

June 18, 2023 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In the backyard of the house where I live with other priests, there is a lemon tree which produces a huge amount of fruit. One evening in the spring I needed some lemons for a chicken dish. I glanced from the kitchen and saw the tree bursting with large, bright, gorgeous lemons, hanging thick on seemingly every branch. Turning to Fr. Bob (I'll change his name to protect the innocent) who sat on the couch, I said, "Father, could you pick a few lemons for me?" He said sure and into the backyard he went. He returned a few minutes later empty handed. "John, there's no lemons. Sorry." I said, "What are you talking about?" I looked again and saw the grapefruit tree on the other side of the yard, which had recently been picked clean of fruit. He didn't see the abundant fruit because he was looking in the wrong place!

Like Fr. Bob, we sadly don't see the fruit all around us. We think that the culture is spiraling down, young people avoid church, and the future looks bleak. Why go out into the world and work? The world looks like a fruit-less tree.

Jesus doesn't see things that way. This week he tells us, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Look again: there is spiritual fruit hanging all around us! The lonely ready to be visited. The sick ready to be healed. The forgotten ready to be remembered. The poor ready to be treated with dignity. The sad ready to be consoled. The young ready for the Gospel. So, let's ask the Lord to send laborers to get to work. And he will. He might send you and me. Just remember to look at the correct trees.

In my last letter, I shared the story of how I knew I wanted to be a priest since the 1st grade, when my parish pastor invited me to make my first confession in the hallway and receive my first communion early so that I could serve Mass for him before he left our parish.

Similarly, the memory of celebrating my first Mass is ingrained in my mind and heart. The joy, the peace, the excitement of that day...

Interestingly, as I prepared for that day, I had a troubling thought. I had always believed in Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist when someone else consecrated the bread and the wine, but would I believe in his true presence when I was the one to say those words: "This is my body..."?

This thought was with me even in the joy of that first Mass. I preached in the homily about the gift of the Eucharist and about the gift of my vocation. I expressed what I still believe, which is that I was destined from all eternity to be a priest, and it was the deepest desire of my heart to serve God in this way. In fact, rather boldly, I ended the homily by saying: "now I am going to do what I was born to do."

As I approached the altar for the first time to offer the gifts of bread and wine myself, I received the chalice gifted to me from the same pastor, who meant so much to me years earlier. Around the rim of that chalice is printed in Latin the first words of the famous hymn of St. Thomas Aquinas: "O Sacred Banquet in which Christ is received"—words that St. Thomas wrote for the feast of Corpus Christi. That antiphon had been on the chalice since 1938 when Monsignor Barry received it for his ordination, and here I was, saying these same words that my pastor did so many years ago.

I can honestly say that that day, when I said the words of Jesus over the bread, "Take this all of you and eat of it, for this is my body which will be given up for you," and then I raised up the consecrated host for all to see, placed it on the paten, and genuflected, I had no doubt that I was genuflecting before the Lord of the Universe. All my doubts faded away and I knew I, too, was a priest of Jesus Christ forever.

Jesus comes to us in the Blessed Sacrament, whether or not we can always believe it.

We have the opportunity and gift to make acts of faith that God is who he says he is, and that he has fulfilled his promises and stands by his Word.

"This is my body, take and eat."

"I am with you always, even unto the end of time."

As we prepare to celebrate the beginning of this new Year of Parish Revival, may we make a renewed prayer, a new act of faith in the Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, and allow him to reveal himself to us in a new way. Jesus' presence in the Eucharist is not static but dynamic. He wants to come to us to change us in this parish year. He wants to change us into himself so we can be his presence in the world.

WHAT EXACTLY DID ST. JOSEPH MODEL FOR CONTEMPORARY DADS?

He showed up

St. Joseph participated in salvation history by being a husband to Mary and a foster father to Jesus. He trusted in God and became the foundation for the Holy Family. Last week my husband has opted for a game of Monopoly Jr. with our 5 year-old over the work call that he "should have taken" and the moment reminded me of the simple value of being present in our children's lives.

He was tender

Our conception of gender roles sometimes confuses this issue. If God our Heavenly Father, is unfailingly tender in His love for us, it stands to reason that His faithful servant, St. Joseph, would have modeled that tenderness towards Jesus. My hands-down, all-time favorite Christmas card depicted the image of an exhausted Mary passed out in the straw while Joseph carefully cradles the infant Jesus.

He was accepting

Let's be real, Mary's pregnancy had to have been pretty shocking for him. Yet, St. Joseph was sensitive enough to fully embrace her and the future that they were creating together. My maternal grandfather was an extraordinary chef and his dream was to open a pizza restaurant. Unfortunately, he was about 15 years ahead of his time and the business failed. Afterwards, he opted to prioritize his young family and find a more stable career. My grandfather later told me that he never once regretted giving up his individual dream for the greater good of his family.

He was courageous

When Herod threatened Jesus' life, St. Joseph prepared his family and immediately fled to Egypt. I associate this part of the infancy narratives with immigrant and migrant fathers in the present day and throughout history who have made an untold number of personal sacrifices and hardships to offer a better life for their children.

He was obedient

By listening to the angel and his dreams, St. Joseph guided the course of salvation history. I once had coffee with a priest friend who was reeling from a meeting with his superior. My friend would soon be moved from the city and the parish that he loved. He was grieving but he also had enough spiritual wisdom to know that wherever he would be sent would be an opportunity to form relationships and ultimately serve the people of God.

For this Father's Day, honor Dads by celebrating the witness of St. Joseph and by offering Pope Francis' prayer to him.

Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To you God entrusted his only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man.

Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life. Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen.
