

Please keep Sandra, her Mother and Father and all her family and friends in your prayers.




GOSPEL MEDITATION

June 25, 2023 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was in middle school, there were times I didn't want my fellow students to see my parents drop me off or pick me up in the school parking lot. I was embarrassed of my parents. Why? I have no idea. Maybe it was our station wagon. Or I didn't want to look like a little kid. But in retrospect that was a silly thing to do. I was a kid. And I had two parents who loved me and had built a wonderful family. I was afraid of the other kids' judgment. How silly! I should have been afraid of forgetting or downplaying my family, which is where my identity had its deep roots.

This is a way to understand Jesus' words to his disciples this Sunday, when he says, "Don't be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna." Fear, in this sense, refers to where we find our deepest identity and our highest love. That's why Jesus says next that when we acknowledge him before others, he will acknowledge us before the Father. It doesn't mean we're brash or boastful. But rather we unhesitatingly and humbly embrace our identity as followers of Jesus and children of God the Father. After all, if we love who we are and where we come from, who cares what the other kids think about us?

Venerable Pierre Toussaint was born into slavery but became an elite hairstylist in New York City and a free man. He used the money he earned to transform the lives of impoverished New Yorkers, former slaves, and immigrants alongside his wife, Servant of God Juliette.

"Family is the single most important thing."

Growing up in a Mexican-American household, everything was centered around family. That is what my parents always talked about. They would remind us, "One day when your dad and I are no longer here, our only hope is that you and your sisters will be friends and support and love one another." So my entire understanding of community was our tight-knit family. Eventually that extended to cousins, aunts, and uncles... but I didn't really see my friends in that "community" picture.

Then, one time, I was at my cousin Monica's house. She always had our family over for a meal and fun on Sundays. They were family days. But one Sunday, my world was turned upside down. There were three other families invited! So honestly, to my unofficial confessors (yes, that's you), I was thinking in my mind, "Who are you people, and why are you here?!"

I was really frustrated, because I wanted that time with my family only—not other people! Well, I kept my mouth shut and dealt with it—after all, I was a guest too. But then, something happened...

I actually enjoyed it! It was amazing! The laughing, the storytelling, the eating, and all of it was great. We spent the whole day together, and it was a ton of fun.

Eventually, a new pattern began of our families being there together. It finally clicked for me that the community was more than just *my* family. Community is about our neighbors. Seeing them as our family. Listening to them, helping them. Being a part of their lives... and letting them be a part of yours.

This was an ah-ha moment for me! The world became so much bigger.

This morning I was reflecting in my holy hour with John 17: "... as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me... [S]o that they be one, as we are one... that the world they may be brought to perfection as one." (John 17:21–23)

The Father and Jesus are asking the same thing that my parents asked us. To be one body, one community of believers, one family.

We just had the feast of the Ascension the other week, but Jesus hasn't left us. Actually, he is here in the Holy Eucharist, but the very reason for this gift of his Body is that he wants us to be connected as one! When we receive the body of Christ, we are being called into communion. As my parents said, we are not always going to be here; our hope is that you will always be there for each other. My mom and dad taught me the foundation of community. We have to be there for each other.

My friends, community starts with the people in our homes. The challenge is that, sometimes, it's the hardest place because we know each other so well. However, if we can practice at home, it will be easier to become one in the bigger community of faith. We will be able to welcome each other more and more into our lives and our greater family. This is part of our Eucharistic Revival—reminding ourselves that Jesus is here with us and living with us in our community. When we welcome each other, love each other, listen to each other, and serve each other, we do this for Jesus.

Jesus is alive! He is here!

This week, I encourage you to take a new look at your family—the ones in your house *and* those outside, and thank the Lord for this gift! Ask him, "Lord, open up the doors of my heart to be a true place of community. Help me see you in my community."

Lectio Divina

Question:

What is Lectio Divina, and how is it associated with the Benedictine Monastic tradition, whose founder, St. Benedict, we honor on July 11?

Answer:

Benedict desired his monks to live in community, praying the Liturgy of the Hours together, contemplating sacred texts, and doing manual labor. The monks developed a technique to facilitate a spiritual and devotional reading of the Bible known as Lectio Divina, the holy reading of a text. This method encourages the reader to hear the biblical text with an open heart and focus on whatever God wants to highlight and then apply it to daily life.

There are variations on Lectio Divina, but essentially, the technique consists of a three-step process of reflection. When the reflection is done with a group, the responses are shared by all the participants. Once the text is selected, it is read meditatively, and the following are then explored: a word or phrase that attracts you; how and where the content of this reading touches your life today; what you believe that God wants you to do during this coming week (month, year, lifetime).

Thanks to Benedict, the Christian community has been gifted with this special way of entering into the biblical text. This week, use the Lectio Divina process on one of the readings for the coming Sunday and make a note of the life connections you are making. How is this reflection on the biblical text drawing you closer to God and others?


