PASTOR'S PAGE

Friends,

One of the most common questions I get during Lent is, "Do I have to follow my Lenten penance (e.g., no chocolate) on Sundays?" But I have a problem with this question – several problems, actually, though it might surprise you how I mean that.

You see, the problem I have with the question is NOT that I think that we should all continue our Lenten penance on Sunday. I have physically counted out, with a calendar in hand, the number of days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday, and the ONLY way to get to 40 days is if you DON'T count the Sundays. So no, you don't *have* to follow your Lenten penance on Sundays, or Solemnities for that matter (the Feast of the Annunciation, the Feast of Saint Joseph, and the Feast of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday). But we are asking the wrong question! Allow me to explain...

I would like to answer our "**wrong**" question with a question of my own: **why are we asking?** Why does it matter to us so much if we are allowed to, for example, eat chocolate again on Sunday? And what do I plan on doing if the answer is the one I'm hoping for? Because THAT reveals the real problem: nothing less than my heart, which is still far from the Lord, as evidenced by my desire to go in full reverse the moment I'm "allowed" to do so.


Let me give as an example a theoretical friend, whom we shall call Zerubabbel (why? because it's one of my favorite weird OT names, and also because I'm pretty sure we don't have any parishioners named "Zerubabbel" who might get offended when I use his name). Zerubabbel gave up his favorite tv show for Lent, and he bravely avoided watching it every night... but every Sunday, he binge watched all 6 hours of the show that he missed the previous week. So what was the point of it all? He would have been better off simply watching 1 hour of tv every night instead of cramming 6 hours in on Sunday. By treating the Lord's Sabbath, our day of rest, like this, Zerubabbel missed out on time he could have spent with his family, on time he should have spent praying and worshipping God on the Lord's day. So I ask again, what was the point of it all? I think we would all agree that he completely blew it, even though, according to the letter of the law, he kept his Lenten penance perfectly. But the way he did it highlights our real problem. Thank you, Zerubabbel!

But there is another, equally important reason why I have a problem with our original question. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus is asked why his disciples do not fast. His answer is very telling: "Can you make wedding guests fast while the bridegroom is with them? The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast in those days" (Lk 5:34-35). Let's look closer at this, and in a particular way, look at his response through the prism of the liturgy. Why? Because every Mass is a remembrance and a re-presenting to the Father of the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ. At every Mass, Christ is present to us, in Word and in Sacrament, but most especially in the Eucharist, which we call "the source and summit of our faith" (CCC 1324-27). But every Sunday Mass (and every Solemnity), in a very special way, is when we as the family of God come together to "do this in memory" of the One who gave every-thing for us! In other words, every Sunday we celebrate the Divine Bridegroom being present with us again! And when the Bridegroom is with us, we cannot ask or demand that the wedding guests (you and I) fast.


This brings up the notion of true Christian freedom, because that is also at stake here. Saint Paul reminds us that, "For freedom Christ has set us free" (Gal 5:1a). We also remember that Sunday – the Lord's day – is given to us as a day of rest. And not just rest from work, but rest from *all* of our burdens... which includes Lenten penance. But what does that have to do with freedom? Well, because the Bridegroom is with us, we are free to decide whether or not we wish to keep our Lenten observance on Sundays or not. We are under no obligation to maintain our fast (though we certainly may – and in some cases, it may even be good for us to do so), just like we are under no obligation to break our fast. We are truly set free in Christ Jesus! And that is worth celebrating! Which is why, every Sunday, no matter what season we are in, the Church collectively exhales, and enters into the Lord's rest. We are free! So I implore you, brothers and sisters, to use your freedom responsibly and well, always keeping your eyes fixed upon Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith – and our Divine Bridegroom. May our Lent be filled with blessing and spiritual fruitfulness, and may the Lord in His great love and mercy transfigure our hearts to be more like His own!

Like many love stories, this one begins with a girl...

I was in college, working a slew of odd jobs, including playing at local bars and restaurants as a solo musician. I MET Amanda at a show one evening, and we hit it off.

Through a series of seemingly odd connections and random run-ins, we began dating each other. Amanda wasn't Catholic, but she was a committed Christian, and early in our relationship I even wondered if I had found "the one."

Then one day we had a serious discussion that revealed substantial theological differences. It sent me on a journey to re -evaluate my Catholic faith. What I found was what Venerable Fulton J. Sheen called "the greatest love story"—I fell in love with Jesus in the Eucharist. Amanda and I eventually parted ways, but my faith was never the same. Like many love stories, this one began with a girl, but it didn't end there.

That experience sent me on the mission of evangelization. If the Eucharist is the greatest gift Jesus could give us, since it is the gift of himself, then everyone should receive this gift. I spent the following years ministering to teenagers and families, sharing this message along with the beauty and depth of our Catholic faith. I've been given "front row seats" to the work that the Holy Spirit is doing in our world, specifically in the United States.

And let me tell you—revival is happening. Revival is here.

I cannot tell you how profoundly blessed I feel to serve as the Chief Mission Officer for the National Eucharistic Congress. Our Lord has been good to me by allowing me to play a small part in the work he is doing. I wake up every day and get to serve the Lord by loving my wife and my children and by empowering the incredible grassroots efforts that make revival possible.

We are all part of that. We are part of this love story that the Lord is telling.

Like any great story, there are mountaintop moments and very dark moments, but the thread throughout it all is the desire of Jesus Christ to revive our Church. Just as he called forth Lazarus from the tomb, he is calling to us. Yes, we are going to have an amazing National Eucharistic Congress that will send us out as missionaries. Yes, we will put forward initiatives at the diocesan and parish levels to help reinvigorate belief and devotion to the Eucharist.

But revival needs to happen in our hearts first. Revival is reinvigorating the love story the Lord has been striving for in your life. It's a radical openness to that transforming love. Revival happens here and now. It's happening as you read this email. Love stories have a beginning, but personal revival does, too. It begins with a moment—sometimes one that doesn't seem big or momentous, but in hindsight, it changes everything.

A quiet time of prayer.

A conversation.

An email.

Revival happens here. The only question we must answer is, "Are we ready for it?"


EXPLORER DAY
