



"Revival's in the Air"

Dear Friends,

Over 1,500 years ago, Pope St. Leo the Great uttered a statement that has reverberated down the ages to our very day: *Christian, remember your dignity*.

Made in God's image and likeness, we are unlike any other creature: we share in God's attributes by way of reason, free will, and the capacity to love as God loves. How remarkable!

Yet, we face attacks to our Christian dignity every day. These often come from without and are ever more easy to recognize: cultural pressures, entertainment that chips away at morality, and laws that place human desires above God's plan for his beautiful world, just to name a few.

Attacks upon our dignity also come from within. St. Paul calls these "works of the flesh" and he lists them clearly for us in Galatians 5:19–21: "Now the works of the flesh are obvious: immorality, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, hatreds, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness...".

The good news is, we are not alone to confront sin in our lives. The Spirit of the Lord *literally dwells in us* when we are in the state of grace. Even when we are outside the state of grace, actual grace is always available to us to draw us back into a relationship with God.

Paul helps us understand this as he goes on to list the fruits—or signs of the presence—of the Spirit in our lives in Galatians 5:22–23: "... love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control."

We belong to Jesus. At every Mass, our encounter with him is deepened as we pray the Mass and receive Jesus in Holy Communion. We become more aware of our Christian dignity—that in Christ, we are adopted children of the Father who will never let us down.

Let's allow Jesus to be our guide and let's allow the Holy Spirit to transform us ever more into the holy men and women God has created us to be. Then, my dear friends, how fruitful will our missionary efforts be as we journey alongside Jesus for the life of the world!

Christian, remember your dignity!



Mary, Mother of God, pray for us. Amen.

Why do we celebrate
Mary, as Mother of the
Church?

The theological roots of this title go back to the early Church. The
Fathers of the Church, holy and studious bishops of the first centuries,
often spoke of Mary as the New Eve. Just as the Woman Eve was "the
mother of all the living" (Gen. 3:20), the Woman Mary was mother of all
those living in Christ. In Revelation 12:17, St. John says that this
Woman's offspring are "those who keep the commandments of God
and bear testimony to Jesus."

The month of May is the "month which the piety of the faithful has especially dedicated to Our Blessed Lady," and it is the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world [pay] to the Queen of Heaven. During this month Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and veneration. In this month, too, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (Paul VI: Encyclical on the *Month of May*, no. 1).

This Christian custom of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin arose at the end of the 13th century. In this way, the Church was able to Christianize the secular feasts which were wont to take place at that time. In the 16th century, books appeared and fostered this devotion.

The practice became especially popular among the members of the Jesuit Order — by 1700 it took hold among their students at the Roman College and a bit later it was publicly practiced in the Gesu Church in Rome. From there it spread to the whole Church.

The practice was granted a partial indulgence by Pius VII in 1815 and a plenary indulgence by Pius IX in 1859. With the complete revision of indulgences in 1966 and the decreased emphasis on specific indulgences, it no longer carries an indulgence; however, it certainly falls within the category of the First General Grant of Indulgences. (A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who, in the performance of their duties and in bearing the trials of life, raise their mind with humble confidence to God, adding — even if only mentally — some pious invocation.
