


GOSPEL MEDITATION

April 21, 2024 4th Sunday of Easter

Recently I was with my little dog Libby at a retreat center in the Arizona desert. I sat in a chair near a ravine filled with shrubs. Unbeknownst to me, Libby wandered down there and disappeared. Suddenly an animal's wild shriek erupted from the area. Without thinking, I bolted down into the ravine fully expecting to see coyotes, javelinas, or rattlesnakes. I didn't care. I desperately wanted to get Libby out of there, without any self-regard. Before I could face whatever danger lay hidden, my dog blissfully trotted out from an entirely different area, utterly unaware that I had (quite heroically) just placed my life on the line.

When the adrenaline wore off, I thought to myself: how far would I have been willing to go to save her? I don't know. But I do know, if I had literally died, my friends and family would have certainly thought me insane for dying for a dog. No offense, Libby.

How passionately Jesus wants us to know him and his willingness to die for us! This week he says, "I know my own and my own know me," and "I lay down my life for the sheep." Here we encounter an insanely excessive love for us. Christianity is a relationship and not simply a religion or ethical code. In Jesus, God rescues and saves us. He laid down his life for you and me — and he has taken it up again. So often we are like Libby — blissfully ignorant of the reality of both our spiritual danger and his saving love. This Easter season, the risen Jesus calls us to be more conscious than ever before about his love. He never ceases to lay down his life for us.

Everyday Stewardship

During the Easter season, we reflect on being followers of the stone that the builders rejected, the crucified and risen Jesus. Like a shepherd he leads us by his voice that echoes throughout the centuries and remains real and effective even in our modern world. To be his disciple means to risk rejection in a similar way as he experienced. The shepherd will not lead his lambs into danger, but there is danger all around us regardless.

Everyday Stewardship can be something we talk about in the abstract or a way of living we simply wish we could follow. It can be an imperfect reality that at times places us in direct conflict with the world. As we decrease and Jesus increases in us, many will be drawn to the love and compassion that flows through us. However, some will see us for fools and will suggest we are ridiculous. Cultivating our gifts for God's sake and the total surrender of all we possess and have become to God is not wise in some eyes. Either they think we are crazy, or, just maybe at times, the example of our lives causes them to question their own values.

If you give a little, you will be admired. If you give a lot, you will be celebrated. If you give it all, you can be rejected. Not everyone will have this negative reaction. Some will see your example and will seek to do the same. They will then join you in following the shepherd. They will become a true sign of Jesus Christ to the world. But their conversion of heart begins with you and your example.



<u>What is Eastertide?</u> STEVEN BOERO // APRIL 09, 2024

Though all the chocolate bunnies have been eaten and all the Easter eggs found (hopefully), the celebration of Easter in the Catholic Church is far from over as Eastertide is just beginning.

Catholics celebrated the Resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday, March 31. But the celebration of Easter through the liturgical season of Eastertide is 50 days long, leading up to Pentecost. It is the longest season in the Church calendar. Also during Eastertide, the Angelus is replaced with the Regina Caeli, continuing the celebration of the Resurrection. But why do Catholics celebrate Easter for 50 days?

The purpose of Eastertide is to bask in the glory of the Resurrection. This time is to reflect on the new life God has given us through the sacrifice of Christ. Everything changed and a single day is not enough time to celebrate the magni-tude of Easter. The Catholic faithful spent 40 days praying, fasting, and giving alms in preparation for the Passion, death, and Resurrection of Christ. In turn, we will spend the next 50 days celebrating Christ's victory over death.

Another reason the Church celebrates Eastertide is to remember the 40 days Christ spent with His Apostles before his Ascension. Just as the disciples rejoiced in the Resurrection for 40 days, learning more from Jesus, the Catholic faithful rejoice during the Easter season.

"It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the Resurrection," according to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Throughout Eastertide, the first readings for every Mass come from the Acts of the Apostles. It will culminate with the reading of Acts 2:1-31 when the Holy Spirit descended on the Apostles at Pentecost.

Andrew Tompkins Memorial College Scholarship Award



Andrew Joseph Tompkins was born to Diana and Paul Tompkins on Easter Sunday, April 12, 1998. He is survived by two sisters, Marion and Julia. He received the sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Communion, and Confirmation at our family parish, Queen of Angels Church in Alpine, California. He was very active in our parish as a member of the children's choir, a long-time altar server, a member of the 412 Church Youth Ministry Group, and he attended the Steubenville Youth Conferences throughout his high school years.

Andrew graduated from Granite Hills High School in 2016 and attended the University of La Verne (ULV) on an academic scholarship to study business marketing. He received the Knights of Columbus scholarship award for the two years he attended ULV and was grateful to the Knights Council for the financial support. Andrew had a passion for learning. He was an Honor Student and an accomplished swimmer and diver in high school and college.

Unfortunately, Andrew was diagnosed with cancer in his second year of college and was forced to suspend his studies while he had surgery and went through chemotherapy for several months. After a very tough battle, the Lord called him home on September 22, 2019 at the age of 21. While Andrew's time at ULV was short, he completed enough units to receive his Associate of Arts degree (posthumous). He was a natural born student and loved school and university life. He would be honored to know that this scholarship fund is now named after him. Indeed, his family is honored that Andrew's memory will live on through all students who go off to college with big hopes and dreams and remain strong in the Catholic faith.

The Knight of Columbus will once again be awarding scholarships to practicing Catholics and members of Queen of Angels Parish. Applicants must be a senior in a Catholic, Public, Charter or accredited Home High School or a full-time student at an accredited College or Trade School. Our Lady of Guadalupe and the Eucharist: Sent as Missionary Messengers

Our Lady of Guadalupe formed St. Juan Diego to be a missionary focused on Jesus. When Juan Diego was sent to Bishop Zumarraga, he didn't feel the need to convince the bishop with embellishment, strong emotions, or his own experience. He simply and carefully presented everything Mary said.

When the bishop asked for a sign in order to believe, Juan Diego was overjoyed and carefully asked him for details about the type of sign he desired. The bishop, in his deep trust of Mary, did not specify the sign. He left it to the Mother of God. Both men trusted that Our Lady would provide the sign that was needed.

Without St. Juan Diego's encounters with Our Lady of Guadalupe, who pointed him to Christ, he could never have been sent as the missionary he was. We cannot give what we do not first receive. When Juan Diego had received the miraculous roses as the sign for the bishop, Our Lady also instructed him to tell the bishop "that I ordered you to climb to the top of the little hill to cut the flowers, and tell him everything you saw and admired; so that you can convince the governing priest, so that he will then do what is entrusted to him, to build my little sacred house that I have asked for."

In our own missionary sending, we must learn to let go of any insecurities that would lead us to 'perform' in order to get the outcome we are seeking. Let us be like St. Juan Diego, who fulfilled his duty with delight as a loving son of Mary in imitation of Jesus. As we grow closer to our Eucharistic Lord, let us become like him whom we worship and receive! Jesus, help us surrender all to you so that we may be fruitful missionary instruments of Eucharistic Revival!
