



Dear Friends,

Earlier this week I was reminded of something very important that I think is worth passing along, something that is important for us to put into practice in general, but that finds particular meaning during the season of Advent. I was sitting by myself before one of the week's daily Masses, praying and collecting my own thoughts as I typically do, when a well-meaning parishioner came up, wanting to talk. The topic is inconsequential to this article, but I was about to emotionally tune him out, as my own thoughts and interior dialogue felt more important to me in the moment. Fortunately I caught myself in time. My encouragement, brothers and sisters, is to remember to place value on what deserves and merits *true* value. Regardless of how important or trivial I thought the topic was at the time, the person in front of me was – IS – important. When we say that people have infinitely more intrinsic value than things (including my own thoughts or even my time), we would do well to recall that forgetting this truth led to perhaps the most embarrassing faux pas in human


history, when the Holy Family was relegated to sleeping a cave despite Mary being late in her third trimester and about to give birth. "There was no room at the inn" (cf. Lk 2:7) is a devastating reminder to us that it is easier than we think to become so preoccupied with things that we *presume* are important, that we can miss what is *truly* important. Friends, please carve out some extra time, even if it's just a few minutes, in your busy schedules this Advent to pray – think of it as "finding room at the inn" if that helps – and take full advantage of the opportunities you have to spend time with the people in your lives, especially family and friends. After God Himself, there is nothing in our lives more important than the people God sends us to love. No one says on their deathbed, "Boy, I sure am glad that I spent those extra hours at work replying to emails," or, "You know what I'm going to miss the most? Getting anxious about silly things, like Christmas shopping and decorations, and then taking out that frustration on my family." People are, and always have been, more important than things. As we continue to prepare for the coming of Christ, I hope we can all remember that, and find room for Jesus, and each other, at the inn.



"Immaculate Mary, your praises we sing!" December 8th is one of our feasts celebrating Mary - the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. From the beginnings of the Church, spiritual writers and theologians have acknowledged the innocence and holiness of Mary. St. Irenaeus called her the "new Eve." Both faced with the pure freedom to accept or reject God, Mary began with work of redemption with her yes to Christ! The Church began to celebrate the feast of Mary's conception in the early Middle Ages. In 1854, Pope Pius IX infallibly declared that Mary was free of original sin from the first moment of her conception. On this feast day, we celebrate the beauty and goodness of Our Lady!

Our Lady of Guadalupe

Ouestion:

Is Our Lady of Guadalupe only a cultural devotion?

You may be familiar with Our Lady of Guadalupe from devotions in Hispanic communities. There is a rich heritage originating in Mexico, the site of the apparition of Our Lady of Guadalupe. But Mary is for all of us! Our Lady of Guadalupe is, in fact, named the patroness of all the Americas, from the Chilean Patagonian mountains to the Arctic islands of Canada. After Mary appeared to St. Juan Diego as a young, mestizo woman, conversions to Catholicism began to grow exponentially throughout Latin America. Our Lady of Guadalupe has been meaningful to the Mexican people, and her image and devotions have been incorporated as broader symbols of culture.

This apparition inspires across lines of nationality and culture. Juan Diego, recipient of the apparition, was a poor laborer. The famous image of Our Lady of Guadalupe did not appear on silk or stone, but on the simple, natural woven fibers of Juan Diego's tunic. The apparition affirms the dignity of the poor and shows striking solidarity. Mary appeared as the people appeared. In the apparition, Mary is indeed radiant, with the sun behind her and a cloak of stars around her. But her dress is simple, and she is pregnant. This apparition also reminds us of the sanctity of life and the need for life's protection at all stages. Mary's moving words to Juan Diego are words for us all: "Am I not here who am your mother? Are you not under my shadow and protection? Are you not in the folds of my mantle, in the crossing of my arms?"



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
