PASTOR'S PAGE

Friends,

Last month I ran across a list of "holidays and observances" for the month of January. Some were unsurprising (e.g., January 1st – New Year's), but others were downright... well, I'll let you decide for yourself what adjective you'd like to assign them.

January 1st – New Year's Day (also apparently National Hangover Day) January 10th – Peculiar Day January 12th – National Pharmacist Day January 13th – Make Your Dream Come True Day January 18th – Martin Luther King Jr. Day January 20th – National Cheese Lovers Day January 29th – National Puzzle Day

From that list I count only two days that I would consider actual holidays, and no, I do not mean National Cheese Lovers Day. But as ludicrous as this list is – and it *is admittedly pretty funny – it highlights something else about human nature that deserves some very real consideration. I think this list of "holidays" inadvertently reveals that we know, deep down, that we were made for joy. And in our vain attempts (cf. Ecc 1-2) to grasp at the joy we know we were created for, we latch on to all sorts of things: puzzles, cheese, dreams, peculiarities, and evidently even hangovers and pharmacists. We do this because we know we were made for something more, something bigger and greater and more magnificent than this world can offer, but when we look around the world we can't seem to find it, whatever "it" is. If we're being honest, we don't even know exactly what we're looking for most of the time, just that our elusive prey goes by the name "happiness." Or so we think, anyway. What we are really searching for is* **JOY**.

Saint Augustine of Hippo put it thus:

"Late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been in you they would have not been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for more. You touched me, and I burned for your peace."

The psalmist put it perhaps even more mystically (Ps 42:1-2), even as he, like Saint Augustine would do some thousand years later, realizes what – or rather, *Who* – *his heart has always yearned for:*

As the deer longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and behold the face of God?

My dear brothers and sisters, it is good for us to celebrate and to enjoy the good things on God's earth. It is good for us to remember the reasons we have to be happy while we sojourn here. But it is far more important, and far better for us, to keep our eyes on Jesus Christ, and to remember **Who** it is that we are really seeking. Because the source of the joy we seek, the joy we know we were created for, is not a thing; He is a Person. We are searching for nothing less than God Himself.

Universal Prayer, (Prayer of the Faithful)

The Universal Prayer is the last part of the Liturgy of the Word. In the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, it states "In the Universal Prayer of Prayers of the Faithful, the people respond in some sense to the Word of God which they have received in faith and, exercising the office of their baptismal Priesthood, offer prayers to God for the salvation of all. It is desirable that there usually be such a form of prayer in Masses celebrated with the people, so that petitions may be offered for holy Church, for those who govern with authority over us, for those weighed down by various needs, for all humanity, and for the salvation of the whole world" (*GIRM, 69*).

These prayers are offered in a general way for the community at large or for some special celebrations such as a wedding or confirmation. After praying the Creed together in Unity, this is just another opportunity for us to join our prayers together, and to stand together in faith as we ask God for what we need. As we come to pray as a community, and not just individually every Sunday. We hope in great faith God hears and accepts our petitions. Let us pray for the needs of the Church this Sunday, knowing that we unite our prayers always.

Singing in Church

Leonard Bernstein, the late great American composer and performer, contributed greatly to our culture. He composed, directed, and played the piano for all his life. The greatest thing he did for us was to give one-hour teaching sessions on TV aimed especially at our young people. He taught the fundamentals of music, gave lessons on the history of music, and above all, showed young people how music is intrinsically woven into our psyches.

It would be very difficult to find a human being who can do without music. Whether we like it or not, our hearts beat with a steady rhythm. Mosquitos buzzing around our ears make a musical sound. Birds sing to attract mates and companions. Music is all around us. We sing to babies to put them to bed. We sing at tail-gate parties and gatherings around a campfire. Above all, we sing when we are in love. We sing to the object of our affection. It is estimated that 90% of all vocal music is written about love.

In St. John's first letter his says, "God is Love". He offers no explanations. He simply makes a statement. We are told to love God. We try our hardest to love God. We come to church to show our love for God. Perhaps to deepen our love for God. This is, perhaps, the greatest argument for singing in church. We should sing to the primary object of our love – GOD. One doesn't have to be a Taylor Swift a Beyonce or Bocelli. One simply must sing from the heart. We must sing to our common beloved.

Please allow me to encourage you to sing heartily in church. Sing whether you know the music or not. Sing whether you feel like it or not. Like smiling, singing does wonders for the psyche. If you are talented and can carry a tune, please consider joining the choir, where you will have the profound task of leading others to sing for our loving God. And, our God whose love for us, is not achievable by any one of us, will smile for your effort.

ST. PAUL CENTER presents 2024 LENT CHALLENGE FXODUS




