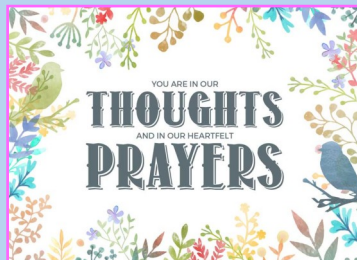

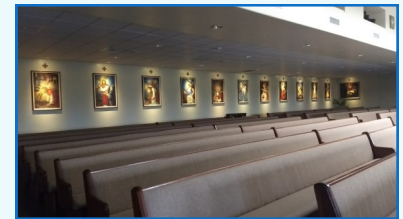

Friends,

I would like to submit a quick follow-up regarding how the Diocese of San Diego recently filed for bankruptcy under Chapter 11. The process itself will likely take several more months, but there are several provisions that protect the entity filing for bankruptcy. For starters, all plaintiffs must file their claims through the Chapter 11 bankruptcy or they will not be eligible to receive anything. My understanding is that in a Chapter 11 bankruptcy class action lawsuit, the courts will determine which plaintiff claims are valid and which are dubious, which means there is at least the possibility that some false claims against the Diocese will be thrown out, hopefully allowing us to focus on helping those who genuinely need healing. Additionally, filing for bankruptcy under Chapter 11 is supposed to protect the Diocese from being prosecuted in the future for any actions committed before the bankruptcy, even if the state of California decides to extend the statute of limitations again. Finally, at least as far as concerns us, all restricted funds—that is, money donated for a specific purpose; for example, the building fund, or money that the donor has designated for a particular ministry—is strictly off limits to the claimants and their lawyers, and cannot be touched in the class action lawsuit.

Again, thank you for your patience and understanding through this difficult time. I encourage you to continue praying for all victims of abuse, especially those harmed by the Church, and please also remember to pray for those who seek to use the Church's past failures as a platform to persecute her. Grace and peace to you in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

June 30, 2024
13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sin isn't given its due these days. Downplaying sin is dangerous. But there is also another spiritual misstep in which we make way too big a deal out of sin. It happens, for example, when we persistently wonder if our confessed sins are "really" forgiven, or suspiciously ponder what God "really" thinks about us, behind His merciful face. Or when someone returns to Church, and we question whether his or her conversion was genuine. Or when we commit some sin and put on a sad face for days, thinking, "Maybe my sins are too great for God to deal with." God save us from that attitude! Well, he does just that, this week, in the raising of Jairus' daughter. The dead twelve-year-old's house is filled with a spirit of excessive moaning and groaning, tumultuous weeping and wailing. They even laugh at Jesus in a mocking tone. It's shocking how easy it is for him to raise the dead child. It is equivalent to gently waking a kid from a light nap. And then he sends her off to get some lunch. No big whoop. The overactive drama is actually part of the problem, and removing it is a key part of the miracle.

Friends, sin can and does kill, but Jesus is always ready and able to raise us back to life, often without much hullabaloo. His ease of forgiving should never be a pretext for presumption, minimizing sin, or taking lightly the cost he pays for our sins on the cross. But for God's sake, we often need Jesus to put out the weepers and wailers. He's the Lord. And remember, the girl is not dead, she's just sleeping.

The Touch of Christ

For a long time, I didn't understand why the virtual Masses of the pandemic were so wearisome to me. Theoretically, shouldn't it be a tired mother's dream, fulfilling her Sunday obligation from the couch, not having to worry how much noise the kids are making?

But it wasn't. Seeing Mass without experiencing it left me hungry. It left me starving.

Then a wise priest explained it to me. "Watching virtual Mass is like taking a virtual shower," he said.

Grace might not be something we can see with our eyes, but it is very much something that is transmitted physically. Jesus has a human body for a reason. He needs to touch people.

We see that nowhere more clearly than in this Gospel. The crowds are pressing on him, everyone trying to get close, everyone trying to share his space. The hemorrhaging woman claws her way through, desperate to make physical contact with him, any part of him, even his cloak. The synagogue official begs Jesus to come and "lay hands" on his daughter, knowing that this is the only way for her to survive. He doesn't ask for Jesus' good thoughts or approving gaze. He knows that isn't what he needs.

In the Gospels, Jesus saves people chiefly through his own touch because he wants to show us — you and me, sitting in the pews — something very important about how we are saved.

But where do you and I find the touch of Jesus Christ? Where do you and I find salvation?

It's in the water flowing over the infant's forehead. It's in the Host dissolving on our tongues. It's in the oil that is pressed to the skin of the confirmand, the dying man, and the brand-new priest. It's in the embrace of the newly married couple. It's in the extended hand of the priest as he says, "Your sins are forgiven."

It's still here, two thousand years later. It's still waiting for us to reach out and grasp it.

"If I but touch his clothes, I shall be cured." — Mark 5:28

“Family is the single most important thing.”

Growing up in a Mexican-American household, *everything* was centered around family. That is what my parents *always* talked about. They would remind us, “One day when your dad and I are no longer here, our only hope is that you and your sisters will be friends and support and love one another.” So my entire understanding of community was our tight-knit family. Eventually that extended to cousins, aunts, and uncles... but I didn’t really see my friends in that “community” picture.

Then, one time, I was at my cousin Monica’s house. She always had our family over for a meal and fun on Sundays. They were family days. But one Sunday, my world was turned upside down. There were three other families invited! So honestly, to my unofficial confessors (yes, that’s you), I was thinking in my mind, “Who are you people, and why are you here?!”

I was really frustrated, because I wanted that time with my family only—not other people! Well, I kept my mouth shut and dealt with it—after all, I was a guest too. But then, something happened...

I actually enjoyed it! It was amazing! The laughing, the storytelling, the eating, and all of it was great. We spent the whole day together, and it was a ton of fun.

Eventually, a new pattern began of our families being there together. It finally clicked for me that the community was more than just **my family**. **Community is about our neighbors. Seeing them as our family. Listening to them, helping them. Being a part of their lives... and letting them be a part of yours.**

This was an *ah-ha* moment for me! The world became so much bigger.

This morning I was reflecting in my holy hour with John 17: “... as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me... [S]o that they be one, as we are one... that the world they may be brought to perfection as one.” (John 17:21–23)

The Father and Jesus are asking the same thing that my parents asked us. To be one body, one community of believers, one family.

We just had the feast of the Ascension the other week, but Jesus hasn’t left us. Actually, he is here in the Holy Eucharist, but the very reason for this gift of his Body is that he wants us to be connected as one! When we receive the body of Christ, we are being called into communion. As my parents said, we are not always going to be here; our hope is that you will always be there for each other. My mom and dad taught me the foundation of community. We have to be there for each other.

My friends, community starts with the people in our homes. The challenge is that, sometimes, it’s the hardest place because we know each other so well. However, if we can practice at home, it will be easier to become one in the bigger community of faith. We will be able to welcome each other more and more into our lives and our greater family. This is part of our Eucharistic Revival—reminding ourselves that Jesus is here with us and living with us in our community. When we welcome each other, love each other, listen to each other, and serve each other, we do this for Jesus.

Jesus is alive! He is here!

This week, I encourage you to take a new look at your family—the ones in your house *and* those outside, and thank the Lord for this gift! Ask him, “Lord, open up the doors of my heart to be a true place of community. Help me see you in my community.”

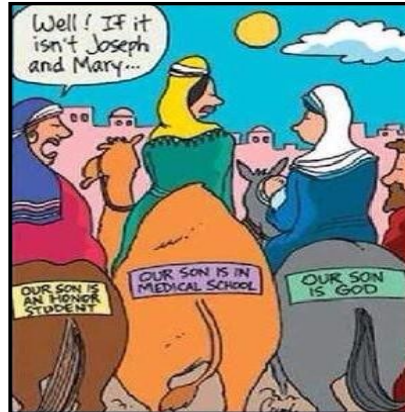


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HOMEBOUND AND SHUT-IN PARISHIONERS
