Dear Friends,

A very happy and blessed Mother's Day to all of you, and of course, especially our mothers!

And while we are all hopefully very grateful to and for our mothers, I would like to also hold up for us Mary the Mother of Jesus, who, since we are members of the Body of Christ (cf. 1 Cor 12), is our mother as well. To paraphrase Saint Louis de Montfort, if Mary is the mother of the head (Christ), then she must also necessarily be the mother for every member of the body (all believers).

And so today I would like to simply offer two short passages from Sacred Scripture, both from John's Gospel. First off, the final – but perhaps most important – words we hear Mary speak, found in John 2:5. "Do whatever he tells you." And second, almost the final words that Jesus spoke before dying on the Cross in John 19:26-27, when he saw Mary his mother standing beside John the beloved disciple. "Woman, behold your son... Son, behold your mother."

Andrew Tompkins Memorial College Scholarship Award



Andrew Joseph Tompkins was born to Diana and Paul Tompkins on Easter Sunday, April 12, 1998. He is survived by two sisters, Marion and Julia. He received the sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Communion, and Confirmation at our family parish, Queen of Angels Church in Alpine, California. He was very active in our parish as a member of the children's choir, a long-time altar server, a member of the 412 Church Youth Ministry Group, and he attended the Steubenville Youth Conferences throughout his high school

Andrew graduated from Granite Hills High School in 2016 and attended the University of La Verne (ULV) on an academic scholarship to study business marketing. He received the Knights of Columbus scholarship award for the two years he attended ULV and was grateful to the Knights Council for the financial support. Andrew had a passion for learning. He was an Honor Student and an accomplished swimmer and diver in high school and college.

Unfortunately, Andrew was diagnosed with cancer in his second year of college and was forced to suspend his studies while he had surgery and went through chemotherapy for several months. After a very tough battle, the Lord called him home on September 22, 2019 at the age of 21. While Andrew's time at ULV was short, he completed enough units to receive his Associate of Arts degree (posthumous). He was a natural born student and loved school and university life. He would be honored to know that this scholarship fund is now named after him. Indeed, his family is honored that Andrew's memory will live on through all students who go off to college with big hopes and dreams and remain strong in the Catholic faith.

The Knight of Columbus will once again be awarding scholarships to practicing Catholics and members of Queen of Angels Parish. Applicants must be a senior in a Catholic, Public, Charter or accredited Home High School or a full-time student at an accredited College or Trade School. I held our youngest child closer on my lap in the creaky pew. We all craned our necks to see how the oldest was progressing in the procession line: *the* procession line to receive his First Holy Communion. The assembly hummed with joyful anticipation...

The moment our son received the Eucharist, a small movement erupted in our pew as the celebratory arm flaps of a toddler and preschooler upended snacks and water bottles while the solemn voice of our kindergarten daughter hushed and shushed. My heart stood still. His little smile confirmed the joy of his first Eucharistic encounter with Jesus in Holy Communion.

A transformation from the inside out occurs the first time we receive the Eucharist. And the many months, years really, of preparing our son, of hoping the fire of love for God leaps from our hearts to enkindle his, culminated in this brief moment. He received Jesus. He received everything he could ever need.

All I want for my children is eternity with God. I would do anything in my power to make this happen—but I can't. I can only show and lead, guide and teach. They have to choose to make God the King of their hearts. Witnessing our son's First Holy Communion was an enormous relief, a sense that at least we'd been able to get our firstborn this far. Our son had experienced God in this intimate way.

- Has your passion for Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament diminished since your own First Holy Communion? Recommit by asking him to transform you through his powerful mercy.
- Someone in your life right now needs your witness to help them heal in their relationship with God. What would you tell them about the intimacy of the Blessed Sacrament and your experience of God?




THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

A message from

Cardinal Robert McElroy

In our parishes are people who live daily with mental illness. At times this may not be evident, and at other times episodes may disrupt every aspect of life, particularly relationships. Most

basic in making a difference in the lives of parishioners with mental illness is a loving regard for the person. As parishioners seek to better understand and cope with the challenges of mental illness, we must accompany them in whatever way possible to communicate that they are not alone on the journey through healing and recovery.

All human life is sacred. Every person is created in God's image. Reflecting the likeness of God, all people are deserving of utmost respect and dignity in the midst of episodes of mental illness. Nothing can diminish the dignity and worth of a person, not mental illness or any condition. Each person is a significant contributor to the wholeness of the Body of Christ, forming a community of faith that celebrates each other's joys and bears each other's burdens. The compassion and love that marks the followers of Jesus must be made visible in the Church's regard for all members of the Body of Christ whose lives are challenged by mental illness. Praying for the grace to love as Jesus loves, growing in the understanding of mental health challenges, being a companion to those in need of acceptance and support: each of these will result in perceptions transformed and help to build a foundation for parish life that will lead to healing for those who struggle.



The month of May is Mental Health Awareness Month. In 2018, the California Catholic Conference of Bishops published a pastoral letter on caring for those who suffer from mental illness "Hope and Healing." The Catholic Church has recognized a need to prioritize mental health as a ministry offering, with Pope Francis speaking to the necessity to destigmatize mental illness and calling for a "culture of community," to attend to those who are suffering, as Christ has called us to do.

Statistics on the prevalence of those suffering with mental illnesses are sobering, but we can also consider mental health as a continuum along which we all fall at various points in our lives. Pope Francis' call to action included sharing that he himself sought professional help for anxiety at age 42. As human beings, none of us are immune from mental sufferings. We all benefit from understanding mental health while learning how we may use our gifts in the service of others.

Research tells us that involvement in a faith-based community contributes to positive mental health outcomes, but also highlights the isolation many feel within their faith community in regard to their mental health struggles.
