

PASTOR'S PAGE

Friends,

As per usual, I'm several weeks late to the party as regards a proper response, but I would like to reflect, if I may, on the earthquake that hit Julian (and us) on April 14th. As I understand it, the initial magnitude was measured at 6.0, then downgraded to 5.1, and finally revised to 5.2, which is apparently where it now stands. I won't pretend that I know how they measure that, or how one decides to reduce that number, but while that isn't the strongest earthquake I've ever experienced (more on that later), it is the strongest one I can remember.

Firstly, I have to say that I happened to be sitting in the rectory chapel at the time, and while several thoughts quickly ran through my mind, one of them rather comically resembled what Yelena Belova says in the movie *Black Widow:* "This would be a cool way to die."

But secondly, I would like to revisit what I mentioned in passing before, how the earthquake on April 14th, while probably the strongest earthquake I can *remember*, is not the strongest earthquake I've *lived through*. Back in 1995, my (military) family lived in Japan, and we were approximately 200 miles away from the 7.0 "Great Hanshin Earthquake" that claimed the lives of at least 5000 people. But I don't remember anything about it except for the interaction with my parents over breakfast later that morning (the earthquake began at 5:46 AM local time and lasted under a minute). I can recall sitting around the table, and my parents looking at all of us with an amused look on their faces before they finally asked, "So...? You guys are okay? You're all finally awake?" All of us looked at them, somewhat bewildered, and asked, "What are you talking about?" That's when we found about the earthquake. My parents had apparently woken up the moment the earthquake started and immediately ran to check on all of us, only to find every single one of their five kids sound asleep and completely unconcerned with the 7.0 earthquake that was shaking our house.

Here's the takeaway... Part of the reason that my siblings and I all slept through the earthquake, despite its great strength, was because we were deep sleepers, and because it was a short earthquake (unlike the April 14th one here, with all of its aftershocks). But I think even more than that, we all slept so soundly despite the earthquake because we knew we were loved. A child who knows he is loved, and who knows he is under the protection of someone who loves him, will sleep soundly because he fears nothing. I would submit that the more we recognize how beloved by God each of us are, and the more we learn to acknowledge and accept the Father's love for us, the less we will fear all of the things that keep us up at night. *Gates of Fire*, one of my favorite historical novels, finally concludes that the opposite of fear is not courage; it is **love**. I am inclined to agree, and so too, I think, is John the Beloved Disciple, who hints at this when he writes, "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear" (1 Jn 4:18a). When God tells us, over and over again, "Do not be afraid," do I listen to Him, or to my fears? It's a question worth asking – and a question, I might add, that demands an answer, because God is love, and perfect love casts out fear (cf. 1 4:8, 18).



GOSPEL MEDITATION

May 18, 2025 5th Sunday of Easter John 13:31-35


I've always found it amazing that Jesus never says to his disciples the straightforward and bumper stickery words "I love you" or "I will always love you" (a la Dolly Parton's song). Why doesn't Jesus say, "I love you"?

Well, actually he does, but in particular ways. He says, "As the Father loves me, so I love you" (John 15:9) thereby rooting his love for us in the space of the Holy Trinity. This week he commands, "Love another as I have loved you" (John 13:34). He presents his love for us as a completed action which continues into the present moment. How has he loved us? By becoming one of us, one with us, and finally giving his life for us in his suffering on the cross. We weren't there when he did that, but neither were his Apostles (except one). Still, that action is his great "I love you" to us.

His love is also hedged in a command: "Love one another." So how can we practically follow it? The great St. John XXIII wrote in his diary that each day he followed this rule: "Only for today, I will do one good deed and not tell anyone about it." The hidden nature of a good deed is a sign that it is truly loving. This week, take on St. John XXIII's practical method of following Jesus' great commandment of love. It's a splendid way to say, "I love you."



May-Mental Health Awareness Month



Saint Dymphna

Patroness of those who suffer with mental and nervous disorders. Saint Dymphna has become increasingly popular in recent years as someone to turn to when experiencing worry, fear, and anxiety. Saint Dymphna can be invoked for help with a range of mental issues, from daily stress to the more serious anxiety disorders.

Her Story: Saint Dymphna was born in the 7th century to a royal family in Ireland. Her mother was a devout Catholic, but her father Damon was not religious. The upbringing and care from her mother instilled a deep faith in Dymphna.

However, her mother died when Dymphna was around fourteen years old. In his grief, Damon suffered from severe mental illness to the point of near insanity. He decided to marry Dymphna to replace his wife, but the girl fled to Belgium with two family servants and a priest, Saint Gerebernus. Unfortunately, Damon tracked down his daughter. After killing the priest, the soldiers were ordered to cut off Dymphna's head if she refused to marry her father.

Remaining true to her faith, the teenager refused to comply. Damon's response was to kill his daughter by his own hand. Dymphna is the patron saint for mental illness as well as therapists, incest victims, and the loss of parents (more on Saint Dymphna).
