

Friends,

One of my favorite movies, for more reasons than I can recount on a single page, is *Top Gun: Maverick*. A quick **spoiler alert** before moving ahead, towards the end of the film, as our two main characters are flying back to the aircraft carrier in a damaged F-14, one of the engines flames out. Rooster, riding in the backseat, and probably thinking about everything they have somehow miraculously managed to survive so far, exasperatedly says to Maverick, "Please don't tell me we lost an engine," to which Maverick humorously replies, "All right, I won't tell you that."

The reason I highlight this part in particular is because this, for me, sums up what the spiritual life often feels like — or perhaps, what it actually *is* like. You see, in the scenes immediately preceding this one, [once again: **spoiler alert**], Maverick saved Rooster's life (nearly sacrificing himself in the process), then along with him commandeered (nautical term, but they're Navy pilots, so it works) an enemy F-14, and defeated two highly advanced enemy fighters in air-to-air combat. While Maverick has been busy doing Maverick things, the list of Rooster's contributions to their shared victory consists of yelling expletives of surprise (for the audience as well as himself), firing flares twice, and shouting, "smoke in the air!" In other words, Maverick has done... well, basically everything necessary for getting them both home. And now, with the aircraft carrier finally in sight, their left engine flames out, and the pretty comical exchange from above takes place. "All right, I won't tell you that," Maverick quips to Rooster, right before safely landing a plane with no tailhook and damaged landing gear onto a moving runway in the middle of the ocean.

Now, maybe I'm on an island here, but I find myself relating to Rooster. If I'm being honest, even his paltry contributions to victory shine brighter than what I am able to bring to the table, especially compared to what Jesus does. It is easy to feel so overwhelmed that, like Rooster, I would rather not know about yet one more thing that has gone wrong on a mission that was doomed from the start, but has somehow, miraculously, turned out better than anyone could have imagined because of the One leading us. Like Rooster, I am completely dependent on Him: the One who is actually flying the plane, the One who sacrificed himself for me, the One who ran to find me when I fell, the One who continues to rescue me and fight for me with the singular purpose of getting me safely home someday. I hope and pray that I am able to cooperate with His grace as well or better than Rooster cooperated with Maverick, though perhaps with fewer expletives, fewer missiles, and more trust. But those lines feel hilariously relatable. "Please don't tell me we lost an engine," I always complain. "All right, I won't tell you that," ever comes the amused reply. "But hang in there. I've got this." Brothers and sisters, it may not always seem like it, but He knows what He's about. Trust Him.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

May 4, 2025 3rd Sunday of Easter John 21:1-19

I eat breakfast. If I don't have something substantial, I'm fading by midmorning. Breakfast is my key meal because it sets up my physical wellbeing for the rest of the day.

Spiritually speaking, we need sustenance to get us going. This is true for the Apostles in this Sunday's remarkable Gospel reading. The risen Jesus makes his third appearance to them in the early morning light and calls, "Come, have breakfast" (John 21:12). The exhausted and cold fishermen sit, and he feeds them bread and fish as the dawn breaks. They are overwhelmed by his presence to the point of awestruck silence. As they eat, their bodies and their hearts come alive. Once refreshed by their morning meal, they will be ready to feed others — indeed, the whole world — with the love of the risen Jesus. But first, they need breakfast from him.

Do you realize how essential early morning prayer is? Jesus desires to refresh us every morning with his word of love, with his grace-filled presence. This week, hear Jesus calling to you: "Come, have breakfast!" Embrace some form of spiritual, meditative practice each morning for spiritual strength to get you going.

Responding to God

Question:

I can't explain it. I feel a nudge from God to something out of the ordinary. How do I respond?

Answer.

You're in good company! Abraham was asked to leave all he knew and loved for a strange land, with only abstract divine assurance that such a sacrifice would be worth it. Plenty of prophets protested against God's call, whether it was claiming they were too young (Jeremiah) or running away entirely, only to end up in a whale's belly (Jonah). St. Joseph was asked to do something very strange. He was asked to believe — on the word of an angelic appearance in a dream — that his betrothed was pregnant not from another man, but by a miraculous intervention of God. Then he was called to marry her.

Author Flannery O'Connor once wrote, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you odd." Sometimes God's invitation might seem strange or challenging. It might require sacrifices we never expected to make. Our life might look different than we had always imagined. But as we all know, life throws its own curveballs, regardless of whether or not we're listening for God's will. Better, one would think, to be open to the promptings of God and to follow along the strange trails that they lead. We have the assurance that, eventually, we will find green pastures.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

May 5, 2025 3rd Sunday of Easter

I am struck by how Jesus addresses the disciples in the 21st chapter of John. They have been fishing all night, and when the dawn comes, Jesus asks, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They hadn't caught a thing, so he tells them what to do to finally fill their nets. These children thought they knew best, but they couldn't get the job done until they listened to Jesus. Like a child who needs a parent, these early followers of Jesus were learning that real maturity of faith requires trusting in and listening to the Teacher.

The stewardship way of life demands of us a certain maturity of discipleship. Just as a child is not yet ready to be a parent, an immature disciple may not yet be ready to sacrifice regardless of the cost or understand the true value of his generosity. So every day, we are challenged and called to respond, sometimes even with little cost to ourselves. But each step, no matter how small, brings with it growth. We are growing not only in maturity, but in the ability to trust in God and how to listen for the call as well.

How mature are you in your faith? How much trust do you have in Jesus Christ? How often do you pause to listen to the instructions of your Teacher? The night is now over, and the dawn is upon you. Reflect on the visible fruit of your stewardship, and then listen for the words of Jesus.
