

# PASTOR'S PAGE

#### <u>Christ conquered Original Sin, restoring us to grace,</u> so, by that same grace of Christ, we could choose to conquer our personal sins.

The first reading this First Sunday of Lent reminds us of the creation of man and woman and how they fell into sin through the allegory of the eating of the fruit of the tree. This is, of course, the Original Sin of Adam and Eve. This is also what the second reading from St. Paul speaks of in his Letter to The Romans, that "*Through one man sin entered the world, and through sin, death, and thus death came to all men, inasmuch as all sinned.*" For this reason St. Augustine says, "*The whole <u>Christian religion</u> may be summed up in the intervention of two men, the one to ruin us [Adam], the other to save us [Jesus]*" (De pecc. orig., xxiv).



- without it we really would not understand the nature of our status as 'fallen', broken;
- we would not stand in need of a remedy for sin, a savior, Jesus The Christ.

It is beneficial as Christians therefore to reflect upon the nature of Original Sin, especially as its effects are transmitted to all people on earth.

In the early Church there were many enemies of Original Sin. By the 4<sup>th</sup> Century a monk in England by the name of Pelagius, attacked the orthodox faith about original sin and grace. Pelagianism said that "*You don't need grace to get to heaven*", and there followed variations on this theme. St. Augustine, called the "Doctor of Grace", because of his writings on this topic, delineated The Church's Teaching, reaffirming the need for grace, as The Lord said: "...apart from Me you can do nothing" [Jn 15:5].

The second great attack on Original Sin occurred at the time of the Protestant Revolution in the 16<sup>th</sup> Century; we call it a 'revolution' not a 'reformation', as it really revolted and threw off the very basic principles of Christian Faith. For the revolters said that Original Sin totally corrupted human nature to such an extent that man could do nothing in his conversion and justification to God. They took The Lord's words: "...apart from Me you can do nothing" too literally. In so doing they denied human free will in the whole process of conversion and justification. The Church responded at the Council of Trent teaching that man mysteriously cooperates in his conversion and justification. Mysteriously, meaning that we can't delineate fully how this happens, but we can most definitely say that it happens.

I think that a third attack on Original Sin is happening in our own day, due to the democratic and egalitarian society in which we live. It is this: when St. Paul says in his Letter to The Romans [5:12], that "*Through one man sin entered the world, and through sin, death, and thus death came to all men, inasmuch as all sinned*." We tend to take exception to the idea that "*all men sinned*" in the sin of Adam.

The principal difficulty of many people today is that *it is unjust to make us responsible for an act committed before our birth.* How – specifically – did we sin, when Adam lived centuries before all of us? To answer this we must remember that Original Sin is not an act, but a state, a permanent privation. Original Sin is spoken of as a "sin" only *analogically*, says the Catechism: "...*it is a sin "contracted" and not "committed" - a state and not an act* [CCC 404]". It goes on to say: "... *original sin does not have the character of a personal fault in any of Adam's descendants. It is a deprivation of original holiness and justice*... [CCC 405]".

This being said however, Original Sin is understood as *voluntary indirectly* through a "moral unity" of wills. St. Thomas Aquinas explains that there is a certain "*moral unity*" of our will with the will of <u>Adam</u>. He says that an individual can be considered as either 1) an individual simply, or 2) as part of a whole, a member of a society of which he belongs. Considered in this second way (as a member of a society), an act can be his although he has not done it himself, nor has it been done by his free will but by the rest of the society or <u>by its head</u>, the nation being considered as doing what the leader [prince] does. For this reason a given society is considered as a single person, of whom the individuals are but the different members of that one person (i.e. 'the body politic'). Thus, a nation, people, or race is considered as one body in this sense. Thus, St. Paul argues, *"For just as the Body is one and has many members, and all the members of the Body, though many, are one Body..."* [I Cor 12:12]. Thus, the 'society of man' who receive their human nature from <u>Adam</u> is to be considered as a single body.

Therefore, Original Sin in humanity as a whole is "not a *personal* crime", "but it is a *paternal* crime" says St. Augustine (Op. imperf., I, 148). Being a distinct person I am not strictly responsible for the crime of another, the act is not mine. Yet, as a member of the human family, I am supposed to have acted with its head who represented it with regard to either the conservation or the loss of grace. I am, therefore, responsible for my privation of grace, taking responsibility in the largest sense of the word.

To understand this better, think about genetic inheritance through chromosomes and DNA. . .

Several years ago, scientists discovered that a gene called ABCC11 determined whether people produced . . . underarm odor or not. While only 98 percent of Europeans have the genes for smelly armpits, most East Asians and almost all Koreans lack the 'smelly gene'. <u>Scientific American Magazine</u> 01/17/2013 www.scientificamerican.com/article/people-without-underarm-protection/

So we see that the curse of smelly armpits is not transmitted to all, we either inherit it or we don't. The minority of people with the gift of rosy armpits are in some sense more blessed than the majority. Life is not always fair in every way, nevertheless, we play the hand we have been dealt (or in this case the armpit). Through this example we can perhaps understand better the transmission of Original Sin that we have all inherited from Adam as being a privation of a gift, even though that stinks too.

Thus, according to Catholic Theology [CCC 375; 397ff], God The Creator, Whose Divine gifts were *not* due to the human race (but were bestowed upon Adam and Eve nonetheless), had the right to bestow them on such conditions as *He* wished and further, to make the conservation of these gifts dependent upon the fidelity of the head of the family. As for example a prince can confer a hereditary dignity on condition that the recipient remains loyal, and that, in case of his rebelling, this dignity shall be withdrawn from him and, in consequence, from his family descendants. For this reason when Eve ate of the fruit of the tree nothing happened. However, as soon as Adam – The Head – had partaken in this sin, as the Scripture says "...*then their eyes were opened*..." And ever since that moment the eyes of humanity have been opened ever wider to the reality of sin, personal and Original. More importantly, since then the eyes of humanity have been opened ever more widely to the need for a Redeemer, Jesus The Lord. This is the sad lesson that history records. But God likes a happy ending!

Finally, the happy lesson, the Good News, is that the Grace of Christ that restores us, the "Children of Adam" to union with God Our Father is *far greater – beyond measure –* than the original grace given to Adam and Eve. As St. Paul says, "*For if, by the transgression of the one man [Adam], death came . . . <u>how much more</u> (he says: how much more!) will those who receive the <u>abundance of grace</u> and of the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ [Rom 5:18]". In other words, we have received grace 'a fortiori' 'all the greater' in Christ.* 

For this reason the Easter Vigil Exultet sings of the "*Felix Culpa*" of Adam: O "Happy Fault", O necessary sin of Adam that has won for us so great a Redeemer, Jesus The Lord! For without the sin of Adam we would never have had experienced so great a Redeemer, God incarnate, Who takes away all evil and transcends it, overcoming the greatest evil with the greatest good. So in the same manner in which we lost grace – through one man – we are redeemed through one greater man: Christ. The grace of Christ comes, however, not through conservation – for "The Children of Adam" never had it – but through the application *and reception* of Justification through a freely offered Living Faith *infused from God above*.

So we may not like the fact that we have inherited the "Sin of Adam", however, we have also gained by that sin, and its inheritance, the potential for salvation by The Redeemer, for as Christ says: *"I came to call, not the righteous, but sinners."* 

So, ultimately by the grace of God the story of Original Sin has a happy ending: Christ the Redeemer of mankind saves us!

### LENT: A GRACE-FILLED OPPORTUNITY TO ROOT OUT SIN By Janel Esker

When our daughter was born, my husband and I bought a tree at an end-of-season sale to plant in her honor. It sat all winter looking quite dead. As warmer temperatures arrived in the spring, I anxiously watched for signs of budding, quite aware of the one year guarantee on my sales receipt—if the tree didn't blossom within the first year, I could uproot it and return it for a full refund.

I'm not sure how I'd have responded if a gardener had begged me to keep the tree past the deadline. I'd lose my chance at a refund, and what would be the likelihood of the tree really "coming back to life" if it hadn't done anything within the first year? 
