
Because of daylight saving, Mass time on Saturdays' will be celebrated at 3:30 PM. Sunday Mass times remain the same.

<u>First Sunday Advent.</u> The Advent of Christ Jesus is the Beginning and the End of all Human History

I had a priest friend named Fr. Athanase Fuchs, O.S.B. He was a saintly man who served the Indian parish in Ball Club, MN for over 40 years. I asked him one time what was his favorite time within the liturgical year, and he said Advent was, the reason being that "We're going somewhere". And he was right, we *are* going somewhere; we are on pilgrimage to heaven and Advent is the time to prepare our hearts for Christ's coming to us. We are moving toward a goal. This first Sunday of Advent let us reflect upon Advent as the beginning, for this is how we begin our Christian world.



It's interesting to note that the calendar dating for Western Civilization (really now, the world) is based upon Christ. We use the demarcation B.C. 'before Christ' and A.D. Anno Domini "in the year of our Lord". In other words, Christ is the center of human history. He is the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end [Rev 1:8; 21:6; 2;13], and He gives purpose to history, by introducing an end or goal. But the end is a new beginning without end, namely eternal life. It was not always this way though. Before Christ there was no real conception of history having a beginning or end. What I mean is that secular pagan history, ancient world history, was based upon nature, with solar and lunar seasons and years. History was seen as cyclical, always revolving and turning with no end in sight. Hence mythology was introduced to explain origins, and to some extent an end, but it was never certain, never clear as to what the heavens and earth were all about. We can see how this cyclical view of history would lend itself to such thoughts as reincarnation and the transmigration of souls. Cremation of the dead was very popular because it was meant to facilitate man's release from matter to the spiritual world. The poplar concept of the afterlife was Hades. Plainly put, man and 'His Story' (history) had no point. There was no real beginning and no real end; there was no purpose. This all changed when God entered human history through His Divine Revelation to Abraham.

It was the religious world of the Jews that first made sense of the origins of all creation in The Book of Genesis. Creation was ex nihilo 'from nothing', created by purpose -- not by chance, or by the whims of some gods. Creation was by the one, just, merciful God of Israel ("Y'H'W'H") whom they called "Adonai" "Lord". Man was made in the image and likeness of God, and it was through man's own sin that evil entered the world. God did not, and could not, create evil; but He did promise to remedy the evil that man brought forth. We can therefore definitely see the start of the true understanding of history, of man, and of creation in the Jewish Divine Revelation. But while they had an understanding of origins, or beginnings, the Jews understood the end that man was called to only vaguely. The underworld or 'Sheol' was unclear for the Jew. This is why the Jewish Pharisees and Sadducees were always fighting about the resurrection.

It was only through the advent of Christ that an eternal vocation from a loving God and Father was revealed to mankind. And in this new end there began a new hope for all people, not just the Jews. The Advent of Christ brought about a goal to be achieved in human history. It was Revelation in Christ that announced an afterlife with clarity and certitude as the Kingdom of Heaven (God). Moreover, all people were invited; it was not just for pharaohs and kings, but for all who had a living faith in the hope of obtaining this blessing through charity in Christ. Once this new concept of God as Father and heaven as an eternal calling was made clear to men they became motivated in a new way previously inconceivable. This new goal to history was now motivated by love: "What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the imagination of man, what God has prepared for those who love Him" [I Cor 2:9]. There was no longer a need to motivate through the fear and tyranny of the pagan gods. Whereas, previously man was pitted against his neighbor by tribal feuds, now man was united to his neighbor who became his brother in the Lord; for one common Father had adopted by grace all mankind as His children.

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It is hard for us who live in a post-Christian world to understand what this meant for a pagan people at the beginning of Christianity. For the ancient people this really was "Good News", it really was the opening of the gates of heaven previously impenetrable to the common people of earth. But for many of us today this "Good News" appears only as "Old Hat". If we are not moved by Christian Faith it is only because we never had a time when we lived without it. We never lived in a world without hope of heaven's kingdom and the promise of eternal life with God Who Is Love. In this post-Christian world of ours we have come to think of heaven as an entitlement, of something that God owes us, and of course as something that God will most certainly give us. We take our Christian Faith for granted.

This is the reason why The Church renews Herself in the Holy Spirit. In a sense, the Church is *always* reforming Herself, *constantly* renewing Herself. This explains how some of Her members actually do become inspired to live as saints; they become inspired to convert their hearts to the Lord. And this, only because the saints 'doing' of Christian things, in the extension of their faith, is first subjected to 'being' Christian, in the intensity of their faith! This is the reason for the Advent season in the liturgy of The Church. Advent is a season of renewal when the Christian can begin again, anew, with a fresh understanding and appreciation of Who Her Lord is.

Twenty centuries ago the advent of Jesus Christ gave new hope to a dying pagan world. The time is very near now for the New Advent of Jesus Christ, in His Mystical Body, to again grant new hope to a world that is killing itself. God, in Christ Jesus, can come to give new hope to this neo-pagan world of ours, this 'culture of death' in which we live. We need to reflect on Christian Faith as revolutionary; as a faith that has changed the world, and as a Faith that God wants to use to reawaken His Love in *our hearts* to change the world again for a New Springtime of Hope in this New Millennium.
