
A Powerful Study on the Life of Jesus Christ



Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass @2001, 1998, 1970 CCD.

The Resurrection of Christ

We rejoice today for Christ Our Lord has conquered sin and death. This is the celebration of the Christian Passover, a "passing over" from sin, suffering, and death, to new life. Christ has given us too, His followers, a newness of life to follow Him and to share in the Eternal Life He has with The Father, and The Holy Spirit. We should therefore reflect upon this Christian Passover, or Easter, and understand in a greater way our vocation to new life in Christ. We see this simply in nature.

When we watch nature programs of animals in far off exotic locations, or the depths of the oceans, we always find a completely satisfied 'ecosystem', a harmony that we call "nature". However, we do not find this harmony with the human person. Universally, whenever and wherever we find the human person living we find the dissatisfaction of a 'fallen system', or what we as Christians call 'sin'. We find an inherent, interior disorder (pride, lust, anger, covetpurpose, approx, aloth, and duttany). Why do we find disorder among humans, indeed within man himself? Cortain

ousness, envy, sloth, and gluttony). Why do we find disorder among humans, indeed within man himself? Certainly, we answer, original sin; but Adam and Eve, even before original sin sought for something more, something beyond all the animals, plants, and fruits of this world. They sought for something eternal...

It is because human beings know -- our human experiences tell us -- that we exist for something more than the material world around us that we are different. Think about it. Cows are satisfied with grass, chickens with grain, monkeys with bananas, but man is not satisfied even with gold. *Man is the only being in all visible creation that cannot adequately be defined in terms of earthly relations*. Man does not exist for the sake of something earthly. Man alone knows that he must go beyond the material world, and even beyond the confines of his own self. There is simply something more out there. We daily experience that nothing in tangible creation satisfies this and us is why we answer the call of the supernatural.

When Jesus called Peter, Andrew, James, and John they answered because they knew there was more to life than fish. When Jesus called Simon the zealot he answered because he knew there was more to life than politics. In addition, when Jesus called Matthew the tax collector he answered because he knew there was more to life than money. All the saints answered the call of God, in Christ Jesus, because they wanted something more than this world had to offer. The world was not enough, but God, heaven, and eternal life would be.

Now, we may ask, what does all this have to do with Easter and the resurrection of Christ? Moreover, the answer is this. When we finally answer the call of God coming to us in the Person of Jesus Christ we should place our whole life at the disposal of God. All the saints became saints, not because of surpassing talents, powers, and abilities, they had none of these (I Cor 1:26; II Cor 11:30). Rather they became saints because *what little they had to offer, they offered entirely and wholeheartedly*. This they did for love of Christ Who alone could offer them eternal life *and an Eternal Love*.

In other words, if we *really* answer the call of Christ we decide, then and there, to make an exchange: an exchange of this body for a glorified body; of this life for a glorified life; of this world for a glorified world. **This is a passage, a** *passing over, or* '**Passover**', from our old life to a new life, and yet beginning in this life. We invest everything in Christ, and in return we receive everything back a hundred-fold. St. Paul called this 'investment' a death, which is what baptism signifies and actually effects. This is why we have been preparing for Easter by sacrifices and penances, to make it clear to all that we have a full share in the life to come, to make it clear to ourselves that we hold back nothing for God. To make it clear that we have died with Christ and so we shall share in the new life of Christ in heaven when our Passover is complete.

The only reason why the Apostles became saints was because they 'passed over' everything to and for Christ, down to their very own lives! They knew that their earthly lives were expendable for the sake of Christ. They knew that Christ, having risen from the dead, had conquered death [Rom 6:9] certainly, <u>but</u> *He had also conquered life*, this worldly, mundane, and often painful life, and exchanged it for a newer and better life in eternity. As our Lord said, "*I have come that you may have life, and have it more abundantly* [Jn 10:10]." and again . . . "That My Joy may be in you, and your joy may be complete [Jn 15:11]." Christ's Resurrection has changed **everything** for us, even down to the last fiber of our being, for if in Christ we can conquer sin and death, who needs this life which is passing away? [II Peter 3:13]. In short, the resurrection of Christ has opened the gates to a new world; it has opened the gates of heaven; it has made for all of us, all things new. And this is the reason why we rejoice so greatly at Easter: because the Resurrection of Christ is new life for us who follow Christ, hence the image of the Easter Egg = new life after the incubation period has passed over. I close with a description of what we will see – if we are faithful -- when our own Passover is complete and our resurrection takes place one day, soon as St. John the beloved Apostle depicts this newness of heaven...

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth. The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. I also saw the holy city, a New Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. TEN REASONS TO BELIEVE IN THE RESURRECTION

Testimony of the texts. Scripture, Tradition and the Church thereafter all agree that Christ rose.

2. **Testimony of the Twelve.** Cowardly apostles fleeing became courageous Christians preaching, and they unanimously said it was because they saw Christ alive.

3. Transformation of Saul. St. Paul went from persecutor to believer after seeing Christ alive.

4. No early Church debate. The early Church debated many fundamental things, but not the Resurrection.

5. **Centuries of martyrs.** Christians, from the Church's first days to our own day, have been willing to die for their conviction that Christ rose from the dead.

6. **Diverse sources.** Gospel writers included different details, and material from different sources — all of which agreed on the fact of the Resurrection.

7. **Eyewitnesses.** St. Paul spoke of how Christ appeared, alive, to 500 at once — and he was writing not long after the event occurred.

8. **Non-Christian historical accounts.** Tacitus and Josephus mention Christ — and describe how Christians endured torture when simply renouncing him would end it.

9. **Not dead again.** Other resurrections are mentioned in the Bible — chiefly Lazarus — but of these Christ's is unique in that it is never suggested that he died again.

10. **Rise of a historical religion.** Christianity spread and grew even though, as St. Paul told Christians from the beginning, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is vain."



DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

April 11, 2021 DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY DEVOTION at 2:00 PM

We will be having a special exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from 2:00 pm—3:30 pm on Divine Mercy Sunday.

Beginning with exposition, and the Litany of The Sacred Heart of Jesus (confession time will follow). The Divine Mercy chaplet will be recited at 3:00 pm with Eucharistic Benediction closing. Please plan to come for at least some of this time to ask for God's Mercy.

The first Sunday after Easter, **April 11**, is Divine Mercy Sunday. To encourage the celebration of God's Mercy, Pope St. John Paul II established this special feast day and enriched it by a plenary indulgence (complete forgiveness of sins and temporal punishment). This favor is granted to the faithful under the usual conditions: 1) Sacramental confession; 2) Eucharistic Communion; 3) Prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The requirement of sacramental confession can be satisfied by all who, with contrite hearts, confess their sins, and do penance. This confession can be made anytime from Easter through Pentecost Sunday.

*In the Penitential Rite we will implore the mercy of God to be detached from all affection for sin.

*In the General Intercessions, we will pray for the Holy Father and his intentions and for great fidelity in our lives to works of charity and mercy, concluding with a devout prayer to our merciful Lord Jesus.

*As always we will pray together the Creed and the Our Father, that as God forgives us we will pardon those who sin against us.

Trusting in our God and His Mercy is an essential element in the celebration of this day. Our Lord gave the Feast of Divine Mercy in private revelations to Saint Maria Faustina, from 1925 until her death in Krakow at the age of just 33 in October 1938. Tears—How Did They Come About?

Eyelids act like squeegees that smooth out the lubricant and thereby improve vision. They also sweep tiny particles into the gutters. (Recall that crusty junk we sometimes find in the corners each eye upon awakening.) The lacrimal system alone suggests design. This flow of tears from the upper—outer to the lower—inner takes advantage of gravity. Without tear ducts, the tears would instantly overflow the eyelids (like the shower flooding the bathtub). Without constant lubrication, our eyes would dry up and scar; bacteria-killing enzymes, we might have constant infections; and without the ability to blink, our eyes would be pock-marked by debris and soon blinded. The eyebrows, eyelashes, eyelids, eyeballs, lacrimal glands, and lubricating fluid all had to have come about as a whole package. Nothing less would have worked.

Tears are much more than a simple compound that can be inexpensively duplicated in a pharmaceutical house and purchased over counter. They come in three very different forms: one geared for lubrication and protection, another associated with sadness, and another associated with happiness. Each type is secreted from a different location, contains different concentrations of salt, maintains different ratios of proteins, and flows at different rates. Emotional tears have 21 percent more proteins, suggesting they carry away chemicals that produce stress. Having a good cry and then feeling better may have a physiological basis.

Only humans seem to have tears for profoundly sad times—and for especially happy occasions. Could this be a function of survival of the fittest or a function of mutation? Hardly. It involves too many specific areas of the brain and the rest of the anatomy. The proponents of evolutionary theories never discuss how the different kinds of tears came about.
