

PASTOR'S PAGE

The single most distinctive quality of Christian Faith may be summed up in the fact that *God became man*; that He was like us in all ways, except sin. St. John the beloved sums it up in the Prelude to his Gospel:

And The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth; and we have beheld His glory, the glory as of the Only Begotten Son of The Father. And from His fullness have we all received, grace upon grace [Jn 1:14].

God has come to save humanity from sin *precisely as a man*; in other words, *bodily*. For this reason we see why Our Lord cared for and healed the *whole* person, soul *and body*. In the Gospel that The Church places before us this Sunday [Mk 1:40–45] we see how, at face value, Jesus cures a leper. When we look at the story in its fullness, however, we can see that it goes beyond a mere physical healing, to betoken the *spiritual healing* by the Divine Physician, Who takes away the sins of the world. To see this we will reflect upon Christ as the Divine Physician, showing how the parallels of the Old Testament to the N.T. are fulfilled in Jesus, the God-man. How leprosy is more than leprosy, and how this Gospel's healing points to the spiritual healing of Fallen Man in Sacramental Reconciliation

(confession). In the O.T. there is an indication that leprosy was equated to sin (cf. Num. 12:10–15; 2 Kings 5:27; 15:5; 2 Chron. 26:20– 21). In Numbers Twelve, Miriam is afflicted with leprosy as punishment for criticizing Moses. Persons, even objects, afflicted with leprosy were deemed 'unclean', and contact with them could render others unclean as well. The O.T instructs how to treat clothing, houses, and persons with leprosy. Eabrics infected with leprosy were to be burned (lev. 13:52, 55, 57), mate-

treat clothing, houses, and persons with leprosy. Fabrics infected with leprosy were to be burned (Lev. 13:52, 55, 57), material articles so infected must be discarded outside the dwelling (14:40, 41, 45). Anyone who enters a leprous house must bathe their body and launder their clothing (14:46–47). A person with leprosy was excluded, ostracized, from the community (13:45–46; cf. Num. 12:15; 2 Kings 7:3–4). So, sin has the effects of leprosy in that it makes one unclean, it disfigures the Likeness of God within us, it separates us from God and other people, and it creates a need to "…go to the priest!".

We see then, how O.T. leprosy foreshadows, and is equated with personal sin in the N.T., as the adage says: "That which is foreshadowed in the O.T. is revealed in The New T." As in the O.T. there was a lamb, so in the N.T. there is a Lamb, Jesus; as in the O.T. there are the 12 Tribes as the People of God, so in the N.T. there are the 12 Apostles as the New People of God; as in the OT there was a temple, so in the N.T. the Christian is the Temple of the Holy Spirit. And leprosy is a parallel to personal sin: but Jesus came to cure us.

Our Lord Himself relates how He is the Divine Physician. He says to the Pharisees "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick." [Mt 9:12]; and again, in Nazareth, "Doubtless you will quote to me the proverb, 'Physician, heal Thyself. . ." [Lk 4:24]. But in the Gospel today the physician, being Divine, ties this physical healing of the leper to the spiritual healing of the soul, when He tells the leper: ". . . go, show yourself to the priest, and offer for your cleansing what Moses commanded, for a proof to the people." In this prescription to "...go to the priest!", Jesus is telling us today the same for our own spiritual healing: "...go to the priest!". The purification rite in the O.T. was not for the removal of leprosy, but for the removal of the state of ritual impurity that the leprosy brought (Mk 1:44). In telling the healed leper to "go to the priest" for the ritual purification, our Lord is saying that the person who seeks healing of body and soul never side-steps The Church and Her priests, there must be a formality of that healing of the soul which must take place at the level of the material body, through The Church.

Jesus tied together *forever* The Church of the Apostles to the personal forgiveness of sins – which is what spiritual healing is – when He said to His Apostles: "... As The Father has sent Me, even so I send you." And ... breathing on the Apostles He said, *"Receive The Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."* [Jn 20 :22]. After the Day of Pentecost, The Church went out to heal and cure all those afflicted with the spiritual leprosy of sin! The terrible disease that disfigured the image and likeness of God in man, which ostracized the sinner from the community of the saints, was to be alleviated by the fulfillment of the injunction "...go to the priest!". <u>Catholic Answers</u>© gives us this description . . .

The means by which God forgives sins after baptism is confession: "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). Minor or venial sins can be confessed directly to God, but for grave or mortal sins, which crush the spiritual life out of the soul, God has instituted a different means for obtaining forgiveness—the sacrament known popularly as confession, penance, or reconciliation.

This sacrament is rooted in the mission God gave to Christ in his capacity as the Son of man on earth to go and forgive sins (cf. Mt. 9:6). Thus, the crowds who witnessed this new power *"glorified God, who had given*

such authority to men" (Matt. 9:8; note the plural "men", that is, particular men). After his resurrection, Jesus passed on His mission to forgive sins to His appointed ministers, telling them, "As The Father has sent Me, even so I send you. . . . Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (John 20:21–23).

Since it is not possible to confess all of our many daily faults, we know that sacramental reconciliation is required only for grave or mortal sins—but it is required, or Christ would not have commanded it. *https://www.catholic.com/tract/confession*

When we sin we come to know *experientially, in our own person,* how it alienates and separates us from God. But sin also alienates us from our fellow man, as witnessed in the first murderous sin (fratricide), when Cain killed his brother Able [Gen 4:5]. God knew of this sinful alienation of man from man because He gave us the human nature that we have. Therefore, the forgiveness of sins is divinely tied to The Church, and only those who "...go to the priest!" are really fulfilling the mandate of Christ, that sins are forgiven through the voice of His Apostolic ministers in The Church. The Church has received The Holy Spirit in such fashion that grants us certitude of the forgiveness of our sins – "He who hears you, hears Me!" [Lk 10:16] – through the words of the priest that we all (even priests) need to hear from time to time:




