

PASTOR'S PAGE

"When I AM Lifted Up From the Earth, I Will Draw All Men to Myself."

In The Gospel that The Church places before us this week [Jn 12:20-33], we see how the Greeks approach Jesus - by way of His Apostles - with the request, "We want to see Jesus." Notice, that in answer to this request, Our Lord begins speaking about something altogether different . . . "His Hour". Why does Our Lord speak in this way? Why not just say "yes" or "no"? What is it about "His Hour" that relates to the Greeks, and indeed all the world? What we will see is that, far from diverging from, or dodging the question, Jesus will answer their desire to see Him, but far more than they could possibly have asked or imagined.

Having faith as our foundation, in order for any person to understand Jesus of Nazareth it is necessary to understand what His purpose of coming into the world was all about. Our Lord came for two reasons. Firstly, He came to redeem mankind from original and personal sin, hence His name 'Jesus' savior. Secondly, His coming was the height or epitome of Divine Revelation, first to the Jews and then, as through them, to all the world. In effect, the purpose of God The Son becoming man, in all ways but sin, was to offer Himself to The Father as a sinless victim for us. He emptied Himself and offered Himself so that we could be saved. This all pointed to the ultimate end of His whole life: the Cross. The late Archbishop Fulton Sheen said of Jesus: 'All men were born into this world for the purpose of living; but, Jesus Christ was the only man who came into this world with the express purpose of dying'. This is why Jesus sums up His whole life by speaking about "His Hour", that is, His Hour of Death.

The 'Hour' Jesus refers to is His Passover Mystery, when Christ will be betrayed and handed over to the pagans to be scourged, crowned with thorns, mocked, and finally, be crucified upon the cross. This Passover Mystery of Christ is *His "passing over" from suffering and death* to *the new glorious life of the Resurrection*. It is for this reason that Jesus refers constantly to the Hour of His glory, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified..." [Jn 12:23; cf also: Jn 2:4; 4:21; "So they sought to arrest Him; but no one laid hands on Him, because His hour had not yet come Jn 7:30"; 8:20; 13:1; 16:32; 17:1]. We see then that the words Our Lord speaks *really are* answering the request of the two Greeks (who represent the pagan nations) "We want to see Jesus...". As Our Lord says, "when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all men to Myself." It is only when the redemptive passion and death of Christ occurs that the world will *really* be able "to see" Jesus for Who He genuinely is -- The Savior of the world! Jesus did manifest Himself to the Jews during His public ministry; however, He would manifest Himself to the world only through The Paschal Mystery of His suffering, death, and resurrection. Nailed to the cross, Jesus became the supreme sign of contradiction for all men and women, the division point [Lk 12:51], or crisis, separating those who will acknowledge Him as Son of God, viz. the saved (the City of God); and those who reject Him, viz. the condemned, (the City of Man) [cf. Jn 3:14-18; Phil 3:18-22].

Why is it that Christ would be able to draw all men to Himself only through the cross? The reason for this is that the Old Law of Moses, with its exterior, physical prescriptions, kept the pagans from entering into the People of God, Israel. The Old Law of the Jews regarding circumcision, dietary, ceremonial, judicial, and purification rites kept the pagan nations from entering into the faith of the One God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. The cross of Christ is the axis point, destroying all these external obstacles and restoring the *interior* obediential faith in Christ that would grant the grace for all to live the moral life of the Natural Law and the holiness without which we can not see God [Mt 5:20]. This is what St. Paul teaches the one-time pagan Christians at Ephesus....

Therefore, remember that at one time you, Gentiles (pagans) in the flesh, called the uncircumcision . . . were at that time without Christ, alienated from the community of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, without hope and without God in the world. <u>But</u> now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have become near by the blood of Christ. <u>For He is our peace</u>, He who made both of us one and broke down the dividing wall of enmity, through his flesh, abolishing the law with its commandments and legal claims, that he might create in Himself one new person in place of the two, thus establishing peace, and might reconcile both with God, in one body, <u>through the cross</u>, putting that enmity to death by it . . . for through Him we both have access in one Spirit to The Father. Eph 2:11-18

Therefore, Our Lord *really does* answer the request of the Greeks who want to see Jesus. For, as Our Lord says: "when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all men to Myself." That is, when I stretch out My arms to manifest My Love for all

mankind, laying down My life for them as The Good Shepherd and The Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world. Then they will see Me, and come to Me, the Living Spring from Who all graces flow, and from Whom Eternal Life is granted.

Therefore, every Christian should manifest the saving power of Christ <u>and His cross</u> (the crucifix). Like the Apostles Philip and Andrew, we should not hesitate to take others to Jesus by showing them the cross by which we are saved. To quote Saint José Maria Escriva:

The cross must also be inserted in the very heart of the world. Jesus wants to be raised on high, there: in the noise of the factories and workshops, in the silence of the libraries, in the loud clamor of the streets, in the stillness of the fields, in the intimacy of the family, in the crowed gatherings, in stadiums.... Wherever there is a Christian striving to lead an honorable life, he should, with his love, set up the cross of Christ, Who attracts all things to Himself".

(José Maria Escriva: The Way of the Cross, 11,3)

NEW FINDINGS IN GLOBAL ARCHEOLOGY!

After digging to a depth of 10 feet last year outside Moscow, Russian scientists found traces of copper cable dating back 100 years. They came to the conclusion that their ancestors already had a telephone network more than 100 years ago!

Sven and Ole have therefore concluded of their ancestors 300 years ago, "Scandinavia had already gone wireless."

The Pontifical Good Friday Collection – April 2, 2021

Providing Care to Christians in the Holy Land

Every year on Good Friday, a collection is taken up in Catholic Churches to support the work of the Franciscans working in the Holy Land. Christians there rely heavily on the help that comes to them during this special day in the Church and our life of faith.

The Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America is the home of a worldwide Commissariat of Friars Minor and monasteries who function as bridges between the Holy Land and Christians all over the world. The Commissariat offices here at the Monastery in Washington, D.C. coordinate the vital support for the work of the Franciscans who work in the Holy Land.

The Franciscans of the Custody of the Holy Land have the unique responsibility of caring for the Holy Places as well as caring for the Christians living in the Holy Land. It is vital that we care for the Christians living in the Holy Land in order to maintain a Christian presence in a land that is filled with a majority Islamic and Jewish population.

The Pontifical Good Friday Collection is applied to these programs below.

Faith, Memory & Culture – The Holy Places

Holy Land Franciscans staff and maintain the Holy places and shrines. This enables those who live in the Holy Land and those who visit to deepen their faith and their spiritual and cultural connection to Salvation history.

Social & Charitable Activities

In order to assist Christians to remain in the Holy Land, including the poor and young couples, the Custody builds thousands of residential units. Additionally, they build senior care facilities. Medical assistance is provided for the needy.

Educational & Scientific Activities

The Franciscans operate and support schools open to all, regardless of religion or nationality. They provide scholarships for students to prepare them to get jobs and remain in the Holy Land as part of living Catholic communities. Funds are distributed to young men studying to become Franciscan priests or brothers. Finally, Franciscan archaeologists pursue ongoing research at the Holy Places discovering historical artifacts.

Pastoral Activities

The Franciscans provide pastoral care in 29 parishes in the Holy Land offering Worship, Christian Formation, youth and family programs.

Liturgical, Ecumenical and Communications Programs

The Franciscan Media Center tells the story of the Holy Land through multimedia distributed throughout the world in more than seven languages. The friars organize Liturgical Celebrations for the local Christians and Pilgrims and share with other Christian communities in the Holy Land in ongoing Ecumenical cooperation.

What was been accomplished from last year's Pontifical Good Friday collection?

*Supported 23 parishes and three academic institutions

*Provided a home for 30 children from homes facing domestic violence

*Offered 400 scholarships for high school and university education

*Helped keep schools open for over 10,000

pre-K through grade 12 students

*Supported 120 men preparing to be priests or brothers

*Restored and maintained 1000+ houses/apartments

for Christian families

*Offered assistance at senior care facilities in Bethlehem and Nazareth

*Created 1,200 jobs in the Holy Land for Christians

*Preserved 65 shrines connected with the life of Jesus and the prophets

THE PRETZEL: A TWISTED HISTORY

The Catholic Church played a leading role in the early history of the pretzel. In the seventh century, the church dictated stricter rules governing fasting and abstinence during Lent than it does today. Pretzels, made of a simple mixture of water, flour and salt, were an ideal food to consume during Lent, when all types of meat, dairy and eggs were prohibited.

The first pretzels were baked as a soft, squishy bread, like the soft pretzels of today. Some say they were originally called "bracellae," the Latin term for "little arms," from which Germans later derived the word "bretzel." According to others, the earliest pretzels were dubbed "pretiolas," meaning "little rewards," and handed out by the monks when their young pupils recited their prayers correctly. Whatever they may have been called, the popularity of these twisty treats spread across Europe during the Middle Ages. Seen as a symbol of good luck, prosperity and spiritual fulfillment, pretzels were also commonly distributed to the poor, as a way of providing them with both spiritual and literal sustenance.

Pretzels—or those who made them—took a particularly dramatic turn in the spotlight in 1510, when Ottoman Turks attempted to invade Vienna, Austria, by digging tunnels underneath the city's walls. Monks baking pretzels in the basement of a monastery heard the enemy's progress and alerted the rest of the city, then helped defeat the Turkish attack. As a reward, the Austrian emperor gave the pretzel bakers their own coat of arms.

By the 17th century, the interlocking loops of the pretzel had come to symbolize undying love as well. Pretzel legend has it that in 1614 in Switzerland, royal couples used a pretzel in their wedding ceremonies (similar to how a wishbone might be used today) to seal the bond of matrimony, and that this custom may have been the origin of the phrase "tying the knot." In Germany—the country and people most associated with the pretzel throughout history—17th-century children wore pretzel necklaces on New Year's to symbolize good luck and prosperity for the coming year.
