PASTOR'S PAGE

Friends,

Our Gospel reading this week, taken from Matthew 25, marks the beginning of the end of the liturgical year, which culminates on the Solemnity of Christ the King. Each of the Sunday Gospel readings from now until the end of the liturgical year are actually closely connected to one another and, if we turn back our Bibles one page to chapter 24, we see that all of them are loving warnings that Jesus gives us so that we will be ready on the day of judgment.

Because our Sunday Gospels don't encompass the entire picture that Jesus is painting with his words, I would like to take a step back and view these two chapters (Mt 24-25) as a whole here, so that when we encounter the specific parts on Sunday we can go deeper into those sections. The overall context changes around the middle of chapter 24, when Jesus shifts from talking about what, we can see with historical hindsight, will be the destruction of Jerusalem in AD 70 by the Romans, to what we now refer to as the final judgment or the last things: Heaven, Hell, and Purgatory. Starting at Mt 24:45, Jesus gives four consecutive warnings, back-to-back-to-back-to-back, in the form of three parables and a pronouncement, telling us how we are to live. The first is a servant (or steward) put over the entire household: the wise and faithful servant takes care of the household and ensures that the other servants who answer to him are fed and cared for; the wicked servant thinks only of himself, indulges his appetites, and beats his fellow servants and maidservants. The second is our Gospel this weekend: the ten virgins, five of whom are wise and have prepared themselves for the Bridegroom's coming, and five of whom are foolish and who miss the wedding feast as a result. The third, which we will hear next week, is the parable of the talents, where a man goes on a journey and entrusts a part of his estate to three different servants, each, we are told, according to his ability, and asks them to be good stewards of what they have received. And the fourth, which we will hear on the Feast of Christ the King, is hopefully a very familiar one, where Jesus proclaims to us, "Amen, amen, I say to you, whatever you did to the least of these my brothers, you did it to me" (Mt 25:40).

All of these parables or examples are connected, and all of them apply to each and every one of us. This becomes more clear when you look more closely at each one, but an even closer look, given the overall context, reveals something else too. The first parable talks of a single servant put over an entire household. The second talks of virgins. The third talks of servants who have been entrusted with their master's wealth. The fourth talks of all the nations being assembled before the Son of Man. Do you see it yet? While all of these are warnings for all of us, each of them also has a particular target audience in addition to the universal call to holiness each one proclaims. The first is a warning to bishops (and especially popes) to feed and nourish their fellow servants as they await the Master's return, and, we might add, to avoid harming the faith of those in the household. The second is a warning to consecrated virgins and religious, to remain vigilant in their faithfulness to the Bridegroom they so eagerly await. The third is a warning to priests and all those entrusted with the ministry of the Church, to maximize their talents so that they are not ashamed when the Master returns and demands an account. And the fourth, which is not so much a parable as it is a pronouncement of what the Son of Man, will do when he returns again, is a warning to all people and all nations that this is the standard by which we will be judged: did we love Jesus hidden in plain sight, in the least of these? As I said, all of these have universal lessons that can and do apply to all of us regardless of our state in life - for example, husbands and fathers should nourish the faith of their households, and all of us will have to give an account for how we used our talents - but within those larger admonitions, Jesus cleverly arranged to talk to specific groups and remind them of their responsibility to live according to their calling. Bringing us back full circle, my encouragement for us as we get to the beginning of the end of the liturgical year is to pay extra attention to the words of these last few Gospel readings, meditate on them in light of the greater context, but also allow the Lord to speak to you through each of these examples as the Holy Spirit challenges each of us to live up to the great calling we have received: nothing less than holiness.

THE YEAR OF EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL

Collect

After the Gloria is a prayer called the Collect. This prayer "sums up and gathers together all the intentions of the day's sacrifice." (Understanding the Mass, p.65).

When the priest invites us to pray, there is a moment of silence in which we can allow ourselves to be aware of God's presence before starting the Collect.

The priest then assumes the "orans" position, which means a position of prayer. This position was used by our Jewish ancestors and then adapted for Christian prayer. One may also notice the position of his arms also resembles the position of Christ's arms on the cross.

When one hears the Collect, one might see that it has a standard four-part structure: (1) An invocation to God, (2) the grounds on which we base our confidence, (3) a petition, and (4) a conclusion.

Let's look at the Collect for this Sunday:

- 1. Almighty and merciful God,
- 2. Graciously keep from us all adversity, so that, unhindered in mind and body alike,
- 3. We may pursue in freedom of heart the things that are yours.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, Forever and ever.

Then we say Amen, which means "I believe." When we say Amen, it is an affirmation of the prayer spoken.

When invited to pray interiorly with the Priest at this time, I hope you listen to how this prayer helps to collect the faithful in prayer.


Everyday Stewardship


